CRUSHED BY THE BOAT.

A PRESS DISPATCH FROM GIBRALTAR SAYS: PETERSON, A SWEDISH QUARTERMASTER, WHO HAD BEEN STEERING THE UTOPIA A SHORT TIME BEFORE THE COLLISION, SAYS THAT JUST BEFORE THE VESSELS CAME TOGETHER HE WAS BELOW.

HE HAD NO TIME, HOWEVER, TO LOWER THE BOAT AWAY, AS THE BOAT OF THE UTOPIA HAD PASSED BENEATH THE WARSHIP, AND IT WAS EVIDENT THAT THE PASSENGER STEAMER WAS RAPIDLY SINKING.

HUNDREDS SANK WITH THE VESSEL.
