WEARY OF THE DODGE

Joe Nicely Exhibits Less Insanity as His Doom Approaches.

MORE ANONYMOUS CONFESSIONS. The Dining Room Girls of a Findlay Hotel Are Out on a Strike.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE OF A YOUNG GIRL. SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.

SOMERSET, March 31.—A. A. Nicely, father of the Niecey boys, has been in town since yesterday, and will remain until after the execution. He is hourly expecting a reprieve for his boys, but at this hour, 7 P. M., no message has been received from the Governor. This morning the old gentleman, accompanied by Lawyer A. B. Coffey, visited the Sheriff's office and asked the Sheriff for four passes to the hanging. A letter came to-day, the envelope directed to the Postmaster, the contents of which are as follows:

Have and Joe Nicely did not kill Humbler more than you did. It was Fitzsimmons and myself, and I hope you will not hang them and you are innocent. I had rather come back and be hanged with them than hang some day. If I get tired of life, I will come back and be hanged with them. Will you not know where he is, but someone near Pittsburgh, I left him. I am going away to try and forget it.

The envelope was postmarked "First and Chest, Day, P. M." Mr. Flegle, one of the watchers, says that he saw a piece of paper, a piece of the call last night, when he turned to the bars and said, "Will you give me a piece of cheese?" at the same time taking a piece through the bars. Joe at once turned around, advanced to him, took the cheese and ate it, showing conclusively that he could both hear and see, and it is not dead and blind, as his counsel asserts. Shortly after eating the cheese he pulled a cigar from his pocket and, advancing to the bars, he said to the watch, showing his gratitude for the cheese. The watch asserts that he exhibits less insanity to-day than for days past. It is presumed he is giving up the dodge.

Have seems fairly cheerful, and says he will march to the trap and meet his doom like a man. He exhibits much more nerve of the late. Both continued to sleep well last night and ate a fair breakfast this morning. The Sheriff gave Mr. Nicely the four passes mentioned, and the relatives are expected at the execution. The question much discussed on the street is, "Will they convict?" and the presence of his relatives have a tendency to deter him?
