

# A DUBIOUS CHANCE

Is All There is for Parnell's Success in the Election at Sligo To-Day,  
TOO GREAT ODDS AGAINST HIM.

Should He Succeed in Winning the Fight, However, He Will Regain All the Ground He Has Lost.

AFTER THE FIRE-ESCAPE OFFENDERS.

Five Men Taken From Jail to Jail Amid Cheering and Singing.

LONDON, April 1.—The contest at Sligo to-morrow will be a sharp one to both sides. To-night both factions express perfect confidence in their respective success. Public sentiment, however, indicates that Parnell will probably be beaten. As a compensation, however, for the disaster this will mean to him, it is pretty generally conceded if he is not beaten he will regain all the ground which he seems recently to have lost. It is thought that while he has made an effective fight, the odds against him are too heavy, and the influence of the priests too strong for him to overcome. At the meeting of the Sligo corporation to-day, the man who has charge of the fire-escape connected with the fire department was called upon to explain why he had allowed the use of the machine at the recent meeting addressed by Mr. Parnell, having reference to the action of the McCarthys who went to the fire station and dragged the machine to the hotel where Mr. Parnell was stopping. There they ran the escape up against the window of his room.

Ran With the Fire Escape.

The man explained that a dozen people had come to him and asked for the machine, saying that a fire had broken out in the building occupied by a doctor. While he was getting the engine ready to take out these people ran off with the fire escape. The corporation says it will prosecute the offenders to the fullest extent.

Left Amid Singing.

McCarty, another inmate, looked well, also as did Nally, who was escorted by the company to a sister a brother of Scrabble. 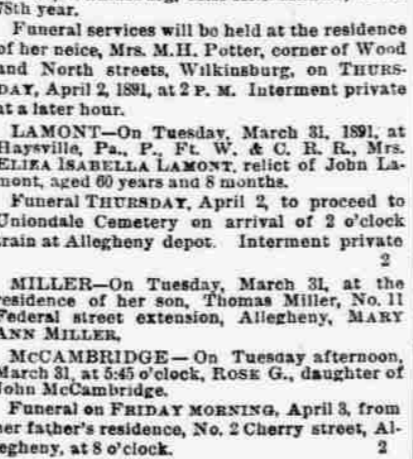

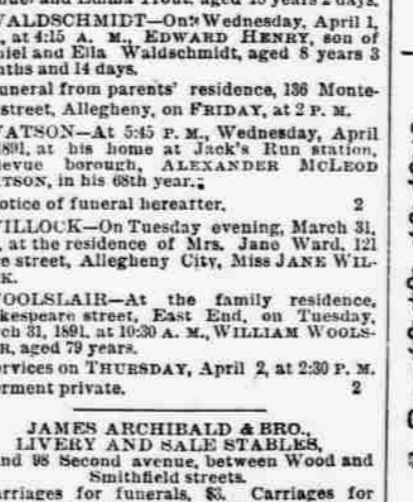

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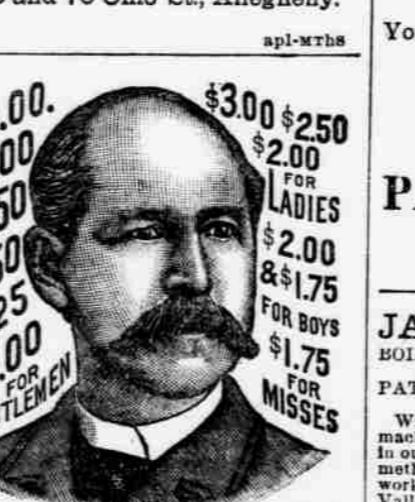
