IBY DUNLAP'S CABLE COMPANY.] LONDON, April L.-The contest at Sligo to-morrow will be a sharp one to both sides. To-night both factions express perfect confidence in their respective success. Public sentiment, however, indicates that Parnell will probably be beaten. As a compensation, however, for the disaster this will mean to him, it is pretty generally conceded if he is not beaten he will regain all the ground which he seems recently to have lost. It is thought that while he has made an

effective fight, the odds against him are too heavy, and the influence of the priests too strong for him to overcome. At the meeting of the Sligo corporation to-day, the man who has charge of the fire-escape connected with the fire department was called upon to explain why he had allowed the use of the machine at the recent meeting ad-dressed by Mr. Parnell, having refer-ence to the action of the Mc-Carthyites who went to the fire station and dragged the machine to the hotel where Mr. Parnell was stopping, and there ran the es-cape up against the window of his room. Ran With the Fire Escape.

The man explained that a dozen people had come to him and asked for the machine, eaving that a fire had broken out in the building occupied by a doctor. While he

building occupied by a doctor. While he was getting the engine ready to take out these people ran off with the fire escape. The corporation says it will prosecute the offenders to the fullest extent.

Further accounts of the removal of the prisoners from the Downpatrick jail say there was a great crowd present to see the Phomix Park murderers as they came up, and when one of the prisoners sang "Gad Save Ireland," the majority of the crowd joined in the song. The greatest interest was shown in Friznarris, who tooked remarkably strong and healthy. He was the most joyous of all the prisoners, and as he came from the building he began to repeat a number of verses of his own composition, referring to incidents that had occurred in the prison since his incarceration.

Lottery Are Indicted. CHICAGO, April L.-An afternoon paper says that the grand jury has found indictments against the proprieters of the Lattle Louisiana Lottery, a concern which has branches in Chi-cago, St. Louis, Kansas City and other places. names of the indicted men are John F. Brady proprietor; John J. Haffy, local agent, and a man named Welker, who seems to have acted as agent for the concern in the receipt of momes, but to have usen repudiated whenever any of the tickets sold by him draw prizes. In this and other ways, it is alleged that the Little Louisiana's succeeded in avoiding payment in most cases. The concern professed to be a duplicate of the Leusiana Lottery of New Orleans on a small scale, and undertook to pay prizes on the winning numbers in the big lottery.




