Cincinnati, O., May 19, 1881, that we may decide on the course the Farmers' Alliance may pursue before the conference meers. I believe I voice the sentiment of the Northwest when I say the Farmers' Alliance in the Northwestern States will either be in union with the South in the middle of the road in 1892, or the Northwestern States will return to their old time majorities for the old party, and the union of the West and South for the protection of their homogenous interests will be deferred for snotner generation."

W. F. Reghtmire, President of the Citizens' Alliance in this State, wrote a letter to several of the Alliance organs in the South a few weeks ago, warning them that unless the farmers of the South deserted the Democracy, the farmers of Kansas would return to the Republican party. His effort bore fruit, and McGrath's more conservative letter is the result. The leaders of the Alliance movement in this State recognize that the failure of the People's party depends upon the action of the Cincinnati conference. If the Southern States succeed in defeating the scheme to form a third party, it will be impossible to keep up the political recognition here.

WILDWOOD WEAKENING.

THAT IS THE ONLY NEWS OF INTEREST FROM THAT FIELD.

Progress of the Wells in That Locality-The Gauge of the McCurdy Pool-The Much Discussed Hassinger Well at Glenshav Investigated.

SPECIAL TRABGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.1 WILDWOOD, April 14.-The only new feature in the Wildwood field to-day is the weakening appearance of the northeast end of the pool. This is shown by the light caliber of the Whitesell No. 12 and 13, which recently came in. Nos, 12 to-night is doing 100 barrels a day, and No. 13 is still drilling in the sand and is making five barrels an hour. This conclusion is further substantiated by the Sunline Oil Company on the Whitesell, 1,800 feet northeast from the foregoing two wells, which is through the third sand and dry. The Smith Oil Company's No. 8 is through the sand and is only doing eight barrels an hour. Its No. 9 is doing 62 barrels a day, and its No. 10 is drilling at 600 feet, while No. 11 has also started drill-

Griffiths & Co.'s Whitesell No. 14 has a rig Griffiths & Co.'s Whitesell No. 14 has a rig up, and No. 15 has a rig building. Queene and the Forest Oil Company's No. 1 Kreizer is doing 3½ barreis an hour, while the same parties have a rig up for their No. 2, and being built for their Nos. 3 and 4. Evans, Mandeville & Co.'s Marks No. 2:s being drilled at 800 feet, and Nos. 2 and 3 have rigs ready for the drill.

Colbar No. 1, with good luck, will reach the sand to-merrow night. This is an important well, being northwest of the Kreizer No. 1 about 500 feet. The Heidelberg will find the sand to-merrow, which is also an important well on a 220 line one-fourth of a mile southwest from the Mack and Kreizer wells, and about the same distance west of the Aiston well.

The Roth Oil Company's Peeples No. 2 expect to find the sand to-night, 300 feet nearly

well.

The Roth Oil Company's Peeples No. 2 expect to find the sand to-night, 300 feet nearly north of the Alston. The same company's Campbell No. 1 found water in the 100-foot, and is now reaming down. In the Alston No. 5 it met with the same obstacle, and is going farough the same process. No. 1 Alston is making nine inches as hour. Dibert & Co., on the Jeany farm, are drilling in the bottom of the 100-foot. This is the farthest well southwest on a 45° line, and will probably get in the latter part of next week. The Smith Oil Company on the McIntire farm, is fishing for a bit, and Kress No. 9 is drilling near the bottom of the sand and doing four inches an hour. No. 12 Kress, which was drilled in yesterday and stated off at 30 inches an hour. Ind declined this morning to 28 inches an hour. Since No. 12 made its advent. He found the well gassing from the 30-foot sand spraying some oil. The oil is of an amber color, and was found five feet in the third sand. A tank was completed Saturday forenon, and to-day at neon at had 5½ mebes of oil therein-equal to about 14 barreis. They have a new line on the shaft, and are experiencing some trouble in getting it to work as there are 1,000 feet of oil in the hole, and the line stretches so fast that they cannot lift the tools from the bottom of the well. They were drilling in this shape to-day. The sand is good, but of a dark gray color, and would be considered a fair producing sand.




