A few figures will suffice to show what the society has accomplished. At the close of the war our church had 75,000 white and 30,000 colored members south of Mason and Dixon's line. To-day in 16 Southern States ve have a membership of 253,600 whites and 257,700 colored people, which is one-fi th of the entire membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Other churches are doing their share, but there are still 5,000,000 people to be reached, and the good work must go on with redoubled energy.

Great Present Need of Money.

"What we need just now more than any-thing else is money. Of all the schools un-der the control of the Methodist Episcopal Church one-third is dependent upon the Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society. We have 315 teachers and a vast ready to pay its rent, but they want to know army of scholars to care for. A generous contribution from our Northern friends is necessary to keep these institutions up." Rev. C. W. Smith, D. D., spoke next on the subject. please. They are willing to allow us to go object to our efforts among the whites, claiming that we ought to stay in our own territory.

No Boundaries to Its Work.

"The Methodist Episcopal Church, however, recognizes no boundaries to its work. In nearly all the slave States we have a conference. In seven we are near in num ber and equal in wealth with the Church South, so the work in the South is progressing as well as anywhere else. Prejulice is fast dving away, however, but, for the reason stated, there never will be a union of the two branches of the church. There are now 280,000 Methodists in the South, with conferences growing rapidly.

"In the schools are some of the best teach-ers in the country, and the work of instruction is in every way satisfactory. So eager are some of the students to learn at a school I visited, they are satisfied to live on the mere pittance of 90 cents a week. Of our 43 schools in the South 21 are for whites," The Rev. Mr. Printiss was followed in a very instructive and entertaining address by Eev. R. H. Allen, D. D., Corresponding Secretary of the Presbyterian Board of Missions to Freedmen, on "Industrial Educa-tion in Christian Schools." Dr. Allen is an old man in the service. His father and grandfather were both owners of large

duptations in the South and slaveholders efore the war. He prefaced his remarks by saying that he has been in personal con-tact with the black men all his life, and that which God had given him was to be used for the amelioration of the colored man's condition.

"That was a grand doxology," he said, "which was my privilege to hear on the morning the emancipation proclamation was read to a throng of 3,000 negroes at a place where I was stopping at the time. I never witnessed unything so grand and imposing in my life. But one great mistake was made. The Government should have prepared the colored man for citizenship when he was freed. There is no negro problem. Give them the Bible and the spelling book, and the country will have nothing to fear. We have more to fear from the hordes of immigrants that are now coming to our shores than we have of the negro.

A Good Citizen and Soldier.

"The colored man makes a good citizen and fearless soldier; 38,742 of them were killed on Southern battle-fields. They as a people will never consent to be taken to Atrica, South America or Mexico, as has en proposed. There are not ships enough to carry them away, and they are being born ter than ships could be built to hold

them. "Some day these men all will vote and what a power is in their hands! There are over 8,000,000 of them. The negro needs chatacter. Educate his head, his hand and his heart, and the work will be a blessing to him. The girls, too, must be saved if the

freedmen must be saved. "Twenty-six years ago the negroes did not even own the clothes they wore. At present 583,000 acres of land in Georgia are owned by colored men, and 374,000 neres in South Carolina, while in the Freedmen's Bank over \$12,000,000 is on deposit. This is a great record, considering the opposition against which the negro has labored." Hev. Dr. Hartzell made an exhibit of the

work done in the industrial school at Orangeburg, S. C. It is known as the Claf-Orangeburg, S. C. 11 is known as the Clai-lin University, and 26 industries are taught in it. The exhibit consisted of wood work, staining and graining; samples of finished iron and steel work, shoes, painting and fancy needlework. There are about 1,000 pupils on the rolls of this school. There is a very flourishing school also at Atlanta, Ga., in which are a foundry and wagon making shop.


