THE NEW RAILROAD Just Established Between Pittsburg and

PHILADELPHIA, April 22.—The new line of the Reading Railroad from this city to Pitts-burg, the West and Southwest, was opened Groceries.

The movement in this line continues active, without any essential change in prices of staples. There is still a scarcity of sugar and markets are firm at the advance already noted. Wholesale grocers report an impossibility to meet orders for some grades of sugar. The west and Soltiness, was opened for business Tuesday. The new work which has just been completed, is at Harrisburg and immediately west of it. The Reading system proper ends at Shippensburg, and from that point to Cherry Run the Western Maryland tracks are to be used. There connection is made with the Baitimore and Ohio. Pittsburg will be reached over the Pittsburg branch of that road from over the Pittsburg branch of that ro-Cumberland. From both New York and

cumberland. From both New York and Philadelphia the new line gives, by way of the main line of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad beyond Cumberland, a route to the Sauthwest, Cincinnati, St. Louis and the lower Mississippi Vailey considerably shorter than any other. From New York to Chicago the distance is very little greater than that of the Pennsylvania, which is the shortest of the trunk lines.

From New York to Harrisburg, by way of Allentown and the Jersey Central or Lehigh Vailey Railroad, the Reading's route is 180 miles long and the Pennsylvania's 196. From Harrisburg to Pittsburg the "Pennsyl" has the shorter line, but beyond that city to Chicago the Baltimore and Ohio road will have, when the road from Akron to Chicago Junction is finished, the shorter route. The new connections will strengthen the Reading in developing its freight business, and so will be of value to Philadelphia in giving it competition. The Reading will be able to sond its Bird coal through Westorn Pennsylvania, and there will come back will be able to send its first coal through west-orn Pennsylvania, and there will come back over its tracks for Philadelphia and Eastern Pennsylvania soft coal and coke from the Cum-berland and Connellsville regions. With its extensive Philadelphia terminals the Reading will doubtless be able to secure a large through traffic for its new route, on which it will have a haul of about 150 miles.




