A Block Gutted and Many Firms and Others Burned Out. SPECIAL TREEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.

FRANKLIN, April 28 .- A very destructive fire occurred here this morning, waping out a large number of business concerns. A heavy gais that had prevailed during the first part of the night had partially subsided, when at 3 o'clock this morning the alarm of fire was sounded rom the G. S. Karus & Co.'s drygoods store in the large Center block, Adjoining it on one side was Martin & Foly's drugstore, and on the other side the E. A. Wilson music store, while over Karn's store was Jackson's pho-

Bell, proper Shealer & Welling, loss \$10,000 and Tully insurent; Jacob Sheasley, dwelling, loss \$2,500, insurance \$1,000; Dr. J. R. Boriand's stillor, loss \$2,000, with no insurance; J. Q.
