He states the bloom has reached that state of development that

Foliage Affords Sufficient Protection to

Defy Even Snow.

only a fierce black frost will hurt it, these dry, white ones having no effect whatever, though had they come a week ago during a time of wet weather, the result would have been serious, Mr. Wilson stated that he had examined cherries and pears as well as apples and found them all in good shape. Still Hopes of a Big Grape Crop. Mrs. Brenn, of Ewing's Mills, said she feared her grapes were all destroyed, but Mr. John Arrass states that grapes are frequently destroyed in spots only by frost and it might be that in some localities they are killed, while in others, a few rods distant, they may be all right. Mrs. Brenn's vineyard is in a deep hollow, where frost strikes severely. Mr. Arrass stated that he had examined cherries and found them in good shape. He states that when the bloom of a cherry decays it forms a dry eavelope which protects the embryo so long as the covering remains and it is still intact. It might be added that the foliage is now so advanced that it forms considerable protection. Mr. Arrass also states that experience has proven that cool, even rather cold weather, is necessary during blooming season to make a perfect crop

ing blooming season to make a perfect crop f applies. If a person of middle age who has well in the country will tax his memory he will secover that such weather as this has not been necommon in May. People in this latitude miles across the country yesterday morning ex-mining each orchard he passed, some above he coal and others as low as the river banks. the coal and others as low as the river banks. He found a small percentage of apple bloom destroyed in every orchard he saw, but not above 5 per cent in any. Some people fear peaches are injured, while others think them all right. Some also expressed the apprehension that so much chiling, while it does not kill the bloom, may cause the fruit to fall later in the season, while others scout the idea and say that all the frost-

Warm Weather Is Promised at Last. There was no frost night before last, Soot arose and blew where it listed and with such force as to blow away frost. After a slight sprinkle of rain there was a light fall of snow, sprinkle of rain there was a light fail of snow, which whitened the hilltops. This settled all apprehension of damage from Wednesday night's weather. Signal Service indications pointed to a light frest last night with higher temperature for to-day, and the wind began shifting from the North about noon. In the West the temperature did not fail below 60° and there was a considerable rainfall in Eastern Ohio.
