MORE POISON FOUND.

Scores of Pittsburg People Who Ate

of the Smoked Sturgeon.

No Fatalities Have as Yet Been Reported by the Physicians.

THE FISH IN STOCK TO BE CONDEMNED

The number of cases of poisoning from smoked sturgeon greatly increased yester-day, and nearly all the physicians on the Hill found patients suffering from the effects of the poison. Dr. J. Guy McCandless made a report to Chief Brown on this subject and and have all the smoked sturgeon in stock condemned. He says he finds that the fish was cured with creosote and it has all the appearance of an overdose. He reported quite a number of persons who were poioned and who came under his direct super-

Chief Brown ordered Superintendent Baker to visit all the places where the fish is sold and condemn it. He warns people to be very careful for the present and abstain from using the meat. Dr. McCandless had 13 cases in three families yesterday and visited numerous other patients. On Wylie avenue the grocer from whom the sturgeon was se cured said he purchased it from Mr. Gledhill. It seems that all the poisoned fish comes from this place, but that is not peculiar, inasmuch as his is the only curing es-

so many people. We received it fresh from D. P. Leonard, of Bay Side, N. J. It was D. P. Leonard, of Bay Side, N. J. It was smoked Friday. We only use hard wood, hickory and sometimes eak. I deny the use of creessote in curing it. I have heard of that being done. The man who does my work has had 40 years' experience, and is certainly competent. These reports are ruining my business. If smoked sturgeon is poisonous I will quit the business."

Dr. C. C. Wiley made a statement yesterday which somewhat explains the creesote story without reflecting on Mr. Gledhill. He says hickory contains a great deal of creesote, and that may have caused the trouble, as that was the wood used in curing this meat. Creesote in small quantities, the doctor says, is a sedative, but in large quantities it is poisonous. Creesote is a distilla-

tities it is poisonous. Creosote is a distilla-tion of wood tar, and it is the acid in the wood that cures the meat. The probabilities are that the meat absorbed too much of the acid from the smoke. Progress of the Poison Patients

At Sharpsburg the majority of the patients are getting along first rate, though some of them are reported no better, and one or two whose names could not be learned may die. The doctors there report that there are only a few new cases, and they are not serious. There are numerous cases in the Lawrenes-ville district. Dr. Henon reports one family in which several members were sick, and had evidently been poisoned by something taken as food.

There are a large number of cases on Mt. Washington, also. Dr. McCocniek is attending a family there, the members of which were poisoned, and he is slightly doubtful were poisoned, and he is slightly doubtful as to their ultimate recovery. It is in the Seventeenth and Eighteenth wards where the greatest number of cases are reported. Nearly all the doctors in that vicinity have several patients under their care, and some of them are very sick. The poison trouble even invaded O'Hara township, where the Boyer family tasted of the spoiled fish and became sick.

of the fish and were not poisoned. One grocer said he sold 50 pounds without having any complaints. Mr. Gledhill said he ate some of the fish and gave some to his friends, and none of them were affected badly.
