Those whe have been sick are getting while. Those who have been sick are getting along very well, and no more deaths are anticipated. Dr. Bebinson, of Sharpsburg, said yesterday, in regard to the man who died there from the poison: "He seemed to die from exhaustion and his symptoms were like sporatic choicra or cholera morbus. He yomited and was attacked with severe cramps and diarrhoen. I was present at the post mortem exhaustion. The report is not yet ready." None of the Sharpsburg doctors had any new cases to report, and all report their patients as doing well.

The Fish a Little Off Color. The family of John Ott, at Sharpsburg, is composed of eight people, and one pound of smoked sturgeon made them all sick. Mr. Ott said yesterday that the fish had a reddish hue instead of being white, as it should

The majority of them who suffered from the poisoning don't care to talk about it and say that now that they have escaped they are going to keep is far away from smoked stargeon as is possible.
