FACTS BROUGHT OUT BY CHEMISTS First Double Inquest Ever Held in All

The first double inquest ever held in All gheny county was conducted by Coroner McDowell yesterday in the stargeon Center county, and Henry Broge, of Eina.

As both inquests were dependent upon the same testimony they were heard together and 12 men instead of 5 occupied the jury box. No verdict has been reached. and the inquests were adjourned until Mon teath resulted from eating decomposing sturgeon, which created an irritant poison out whether the responsibility can be fixe

s as yet undecided. James T. Rourke, son of the late Thoms Rourke, testified that he and his father had eaten smoked sturgeon bought from Mr Gledhill on May 18, and that night both had been very sick. He recovered, but his father died. Dr. Tracy, the family physician, de-clared it was poisoning and that the patients had vomited and purged all night.

The Result of the Autopsy. Dr. J. Guy McCandless said he and Dr Tracy had held an autopsy. The stomach E. T. Knox, a reporter, testified to taking three samples of sturgeon to Hunt & Clapp for analysis and Captain A. E. Hunt testified to having received them and turned them over to James O. Handy, their head chemist,

malysis of the stomachs of Thomas Roucke and Henry Broye. Part of the stomach of ir. Rourke was much inflamed but there Mr. Rourke was much inflamed but there was no evidence of arsenic or other metallic poisons. The inner membrane was inflamed and the stomachs therefore not in a healthy condition. The exterior and interior of the stomach of Henry Broge, were very much inflamed. The stomach countained a dark greenish mass; also a large quantity of bismuth. The witness made an analysis of the same fish, and in two of the pleces found a great deal of decomposition. The witness thought that if the fish had been properly cured it would not have decomposed.

Coroner McDowell then produced some of
the smoked sturgeon, but when the package
was open it was found alive with magthat after vomiting and purging there would be no poisons remaining in the stomach, so that the report of the chemist was what he thought it would be.

What an Analysis Has Proved. Dr. Johnson testified to having held the autopsy on Henry Broge, and the chemical analysis was as he expected. He had given the deceased bismuth to allay vomiting and

Henry Bleil, of Etna, testified that Mrs. Broge was at his store on May 16. He had sturgeon for sale, and purchased it from Mr. Gledhill's wagon on the 18th. He purchased 20 pounds of it at 10 cents per pound. The witness a few days previous had purchased five pounds from J. L. Wyland, paying 15 cents are round, but this was used in his cents per pound, but this was used in his own family. Some 13 or 14 people, to whom he sold the sturgeon bought from Mr. Gled-hill, became sick; among them was his own

John Sayder was employed by Mr. Gledhill smoking fish. Two weeks ago he smoked ar barrels of sturgeon. The fish were in ad condition when they were cured id smoked. No chemicals were ed in the smoking. The witness aid not tell how long sturgeon would keep it was properly smoked.

James Lavned is Mr. Snyder's assistant, the four barrels of fish smoked two weeks o were in first-class condition and had no ms of decay.

How Long Sturgeon Can Be Kent. Frederick Smith of New York, is in the

sh business and handles sturgeon, both fresh and salt water. The length of keeping of smoked sturgeon depends entirely on the weather and will average from 4 to 12 days. Sturgeon is often frozen, and in this way will keep for two years. The witness has been in the fish business nearly all his life and never knew of any disease among sturgeon and never knew or heard of any sturgeon poisoning before.

Meat and Milk Inspector McCutcheon said he visited Mr. Gledhill's smokehouse and all the sturgeon there were in good condition.

G. H. Gledhill was next examined. He testified that on May 12 he had received four barrels of sturgeon from Bayside, N. J. These four barrels were sent direct to the sinckehouse. The witness did not examine them and could not say what condition they were in. He had, however, received a telegram from the shippers stating that they were in good condition. This sturgeon cost him 3½ cents per pound and when expressing was paid and the labor of smoking it would cost about 8 cents per pound and he could readily afford to sell it at 10 cents.
