Wheat Generally Strong, but Dispa Teiling of Bad Weather Prevent a Large Business and Have a Bullish Tendency-Corn Firm but Beaction Follows. CHICAGO-Wheat was generally stron to-day, especially around the opening. Cables were about steady. There were disatches telling of bad weather from variou oints in winter wheat belt where the har vest is now in progress, but the weather map indicated much more clear weather in ose sections than during the latter part o

last week. Private advices from Kansas, Nebraska, Central Ohio and parts of Indiana were received, telling of deterioration in the condition of the crop. These were bullish in

their effect, but apparently the chief factor leading to an advance in prices at the opening was the fearful manipulation in July. Only a few days remain until July will be-

Only a few days remain until July will be-come the current month, and the shorts have become nervous over the action of prices in that future during the past few days. This is highly reassuring news, be-cause the current doubt over our ability to recover our gold has been chiefly based on the obstinacy with which London is ex-pected to hold on to its own stock, but even London will presently be able to forecast the future with more assurance. Early next month the Russian Government will call for something over £2,00,000 of the gold now held in the Bank of England vaults, and this will precically close Russin's ac-count with London. It is not likely that the account will be reopened.
