

CALLE INTO COURT.

Chief Bigelow to Answer on Friday for Failing to Obey Orders.

NUISANCE THAT MUST BE ABATED Mrs. Love's Sensational Answer to Her Husband's Divorce Plea.

YESTERDAY IN THE VARIOUS COURTS

Judge Collier yesterday fixed next Friday for a hearing on the rule for an attachment to bring Chief Bigelow, of the Department of Public Works, into court for contempt. The case is the one in which Chief Bigelow was convicted in the Criminal Court of misdemeanor in maintaining a nuisance. The nuisance consisted of filling in along the wharf. It was objected to by Reese & Co., who entered suit against him charging that he was destroying the wharf for wharf purposes. The court suspended sentence in the case for a time pending the pending legislation which would give the Chief of the Department of Public Works power to make such alterations on the wharf as he chose. Sentence was suspended, however, and Chief Bigelow ordered to abate the nuisance within a specified time. He has refused to do so and a petition for an attachment for contempt of court was filed. Friday was fixed for a hearing on the attachment to be issued to bring the defendant into court.

ALL ALLEGATIONS DENIED.

Mrs. M. D. Love's Response to Her Husband's Suit for Divorce.

Mrs. M. D. Love yesterday filed an answer to the suit for divorce brought against her by her husband, L. E. Love. Mrs. Love denies the charges made by her husband. She says that their separation from July to September, 1900, was by mutual agreement under articles of separation, caused by his cruel and barbarous treatment of her. She says that she was never in any way better and treat her as a husband should. He, however, continued his cruel treatment. She denies that she was too friendly with Dell Stevens, who was her husband's friend, and that she brought her to her home. Several times when Stevens wanted to leave Love's home she refused to do so. She says she frequently brought liquor to the house and compelled her husband to drink it and also made it a habit to go to the store and buy liquor for her husband. She says she did not wish to know, and tell improper stories while she was present. She says she never made any arrangements to go to the city with other men, especially Stevens. She says she never went to improper places with Stevens. In conclusion she asks that the suit be dismissed.

DISAPPOINTED THE CROWD.

The Fitzsimmons Trial Not to Come Off Until Next Week.

The trial of A. G. Budd, alias Fitzsimmons, the murderer of Detective Robinson, does not begin until next week. The trial of the other defendants, including the robbery of Kelly's dry-goods store and Schmidt's jewelry store in McKeesport, was postponed yesterday at the request of Thomas M. Mitchell, counsel for the defense, who wished to go to Harrisburg to appear before the pardon board in behalf of Alexander Kulan, the murderer of Mrs. Rudert, of Trenton. The courtroom was crowded by curious persons who wanted to see Fitzsimmons and Laura Hill, but they were disappointed. The case goes over until next week.

AFTER A COKE KING.

Three Suits Aggregating Over \$200,000 Filed Against Him on the Same Day.

In the United States Circuit Court yesterday three suits were filed against W. J. Egan, coke operator, of Fayette county. The first was by James M. Long to recover \$175,000 claimed to be due on a contract to purchase 350 acres of coal land in Franklin township, Fayette county. The second suit was by Robert S. Boyd to recover \$50,000 damages for 10,108 bushels of coal alleged to have been delivered by Egan on coal land belonging to Boyd. Philip Reagan sued for a like amount of damages for 10,108 bushels of coal delivered by Egan on land owned by him.
