It Proves to Be a Black Eye Temporarily for That Locality.

THREE WELLS NOW DUE NEAR IT.

A Good Well Showing at Moon, and a Dry Hole in the Thorn Run Field.

ACTIVITY IN BUTLER COUNTY FIELDS

The well of Black & Co., on the Bubb farm in Northeast Wildwood, will be a small producer. One of the owners said last evening that the heavy showing made by it Monday was due to the fact that it had been allowed to stand over Sunday, and when the tools were drawn Monday morning the gas threw what oil there was in the hole into the air.

Work at the well on the Fox farm has been stopped for the present and also at the Bubb No. 2. These have been shut down to await arrangements at Bowman No. 4 and No. 5, on the Whitesell, and Griffith and the Forest Oil Company's No. 16, on the Whitesell, all of which are due to be drilled tomorrow.

The Bubb No. 16 is only 30 feet in the sand and but small hopes are entertained of getting a better pay further down. The tools were fished out of the Forest Oil Company's No. 16, on the Whitesell, yesterday and last night it was making 125 barrels an hour. At the Kennedy No. 4, on the P. & W. lot, the rope was cut 100 feet too short, and they are off fishing in consequence.

Northeast McCurdy. McCurdy-Black & Guffey will commence drilling past the tools in their Andrews farm well today. They had gone to the surface yesterday, but were unable to move them. They got one string of tools out of the well on the Mink farm yesterday, and there are yet two strings to be run. There No. 1 and 2 on the Aiken are down 600 and 500 feet respectively. Guffey & Guffey on the Adams farm, near the Thorn Run, are down 1,000 feet. Patterson & Co.'s Fincle farm well is making 125 barrels a day, and the Harrison well is shut.

In the Satellite. Moos-The Rannhwa Oil Company's No. 3, on the George Springs, 100 feet west of the M. O. C. No. 1, is four feet in the sand and is showing a 1 1/2 barrel well. The No. 3, is due tomorrow. Boden & Co.'s well on the P. H. Stevenson is due today. The Harper No. 1, on the Orion Oil Company's farm, is down 1,000 feet. Stevenson well was shot yesterday.

Around Coraopolis. THORN RUN-Black & Emerson's No. 4, on the farm, is showing a 1 1/2 barrel well. The Forest Oil Company's No. 1, on the James Neely, is in and showing a good well. It is 80 feet west of the No. 2 on the Curry. It is on the Curry, is through the sand and bit.

From Butler County. PETERSVILLE-Gueckert & Co.'s No. 7 Humphrey is showing for a good well. It has not been thoroughly cleaned out. Their No. 8 is down 1,000 feet. ZELMER-Parsons & Tate have a rig up for their No. 3 on the Allen. Their No. 1, is down 1,000 feet. They are building rigs for Nos. 2 and 3 on the same farm. Patterson & Latsch have just finished a rig on the Allen. Perrin & Co.'s No. 1, on the Kootenai, is in and showing a good well. They are building a rig for No. 2.

MILLERS-They Bros. well on the graveyard lot is finished, and a rig for the French District. McDONALD-The Royal Gas Company's No. 3, K. McDonald, is in the fifth sand and showing for a well in that sand. Their "Nickel Plate" or "Sawyer's" No. 2, is 200 barrels from the Gordon from Saturday evening to Monday morning. Finegan & Downing's Magnet oil well made 45 barrels a day. They are building rigs for Nos. 3 and 4 on the same farm.
