The bosses lose beavily through work not done, but they claim they have an oppor-tunity to regain a portion of their lost time. It will be difficult for the community in general to regain its loss. There is scarcely an industry that has not felt the effects of the prolonged strike and none will be more pleased that the difficulty is at an end than of the p the merchants.


