PRESIDENT POTTS SMILES AUDIBLY

At the Idea of a Corporation Running a Farmers' Campaign.

THE OLD AND THE NEW CONTRASTED

SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.

SOMERSET, Pa., July 8.—The article concerning the Pennsylvania Farmers' Alliance and Industrial Union in the Dispatch of Monday occasioned considerable comment hereabout, because Somerset is the home of the new State Farmers' Alliance, of which E. H. Werner, editor of the Dispatch, is secretary and J. S. Potts, of Indiana county, is president.

President Potts, of the new Alliance organization, is in Somerset today on business connected with the Alliance. Mr. Potts is a tall, lean, young man, not over 30 years of age, walks awkwardly, and swings his long arms with a longitudinal and latitudinal freedom that suggests his home in Indiana to be a sparsely settled community. The Dispatch correspondent is unable to complete the picture by interviewing the president and President Potts, because he overlooked the essential inquiry as to whether Mr. Potts wears socks. Up to the time when the new State Farmers' Alliance was formed in Western Pennsylvania Mr. Potts followed farming in Indiana county during the summer months and taught school in the winter. He now gives all his time to the organization of the new Alliance lodges, a work in which he is said to be remarkably successful, being well versed with the current Alliance arguments and makes the regulation Alliance spread-egg speeches. He is a regular Alliance hustler.

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THOUSANDS ARE EXPECTED.

Railroads Will Give Cheap Rates to the Fall of Pompeii.

The Passenger Agents Association met in the office of E. D. Smith yesterday afternoon to consider the proposition of R. W. Bornheisel that excursion rates should be allowed for visitors to the "Fall of Pompeii," that is to open at Recreation Park on the 21st of July. The association took kindly to the idea and made a rate identical with that given to the Exposition. Tickets will be sold from points within 100 miles radius of Pittsburgh as low as have ever been given to anybody.

DOMINATED BY A RAILROAD CORPORATION

It is too preposterous to enlist intelligent farmers in its ranks. Only last winter the organized farmers of the State, under the splendid leadership of Mr. Giles D. Price, of Erie, had a revenue bill, known as the "Bayer tax" bill, passed by the House at Harrisburg. In the Senate the railroad influence had the Bayer tax bill substituted, which gives only partial relief to the tax-oppressed farmers of the State.

MONUMENTS OF INELEGIBILITY

Stalking among the farmers of the State, challenging the eligibility of such a plain, earnest worker as Brother Hay, who enjoys the fullest confidence of the membership in Western Pennsylvania, shook the confidence of the members in the West so irreparably that some abandonment of the new organization were the only possible alternatives. Eligibility, like charity, should begin at home.

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FRUIT PINWHEELS.

Mix together and rub through a sieve one pint of flour, one half cup of sugar, half a teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of Cleveland's baking powder. Into this mixture rub two generous tablespoonfuls of butter. Wet with a scant half-pint of milk. Sprinkle the board with flour, and, putting the dough upon it, roll down to a large square about half an inch thick. Spread a heaping tablespoonful of soft butter on this and then spread with a cupful of sugar and a cupful of currants. Grate a little nutmeg over all, and roll up like a jelly roll—or pinwheel style. Cut in slices about three-quarters of an inch thick and lay in well buttered pans. Do not let the slices touch each other. Bake in a very quick oven for about twelve minutes.
