They present a fair out-side and would deceive the unexperienced, but the practiced eye readily detects their hollowness. Commission men are abused by shippers because of their failure to sell this class of cattle, whereas the whole trou-ble lies in the failure of the farmer to feed a sufficient amount of corn. THAT ALLIANCE TRUST

For the Holding of Wheat for Better Prices Frightens the Bears Out of the Market-Corn Strong and Higher-Oats Unsettled-Provisions Dull.

CHICAGO-There was a bullish feeling in the wheat pit at the opening this morning. Liverpool cables reported prices firm and 1/4 higher. The weather map showed rains in a considerable portion of the wheat belt where the harvest is in progress, and a statement was published to the effect that a concorted movement was on foot having as its

object the holding of the present crop of wheat in the farmers' hands until the prices

object the poining of the present crop of wheat in the farmers' hands until the prices should advance to \$1.35 per bushel at New York. All had the tendency to stimulate buying and to make seliers cautious. The story of the alleged combination was pretty widely telegraphed to cities last night, and it brought some buying orders at the opening here to day. Later, when the news had begun to lose its effect and the bears had started in to depress prices, a new buil impetus was given by *Bradstret's* re-ports, showing that the visible supply had decreased 1.525,000 bushels east of the Rocky Mountains during the past week. But the boom was soon punctured. Then it was re-ported that the Alliance story was faked up by a firm whose country clientage was heavily loaded up with high priced wheat and was a desperate effort to help them out, and was a desperate effort to help them out, and was a desperate off or new wheat in, with 30 of them on contract. Other markets failed to respond to our strength, and then came news of clearing weather in the West, Weakening factors finally resulted in a break of about %c from the previous top puckes, but recovered some later.

Provisions were dull and weak on large re-ceipts of hogs and a decline of 5 cents at the stock yards. Trade was very slow. There was a little show of strength early in sym-pathy with grains, but it quickly disap-peared, and a dull, dragging market fol-lowed.
