For this reason, if for no other, I admit that it is necessary for men to organize. But going into unions is expensive and the fees are annually growine larger. Machinery costs money, and so have their secret troubles. Not a young locs the machinery of an organization. Hence I am not quite sure that an union equal to what it costs." union equal to what it costs."
Taking up the disadvantages in unions Mr.
Oblinam said: "Skilled workmen are commeet that combination. But that weapon is too freely used. Strikes of any sort ought to be the last resort. To use violence is always a depredation. Strikes are not always successful. They always arouse the sternest opposition of the bosses and while a strike is in progress, that friendly relation that ought to exist between employer and employed is an unknown ployed is an unknown quantity. Capital can always stand a strike better than labor. There are thousands of dolbetween capital and starvation; not so with labor. Workmen of afford to see the wife and children suffering from hunger. Their manhood will not allow them. Labor can be imported, at capital cannot. You cannot get a capi-list to erect a factory for the purpose of farnishing employment to strikers,"

Mr. Ordham concluded by advising the abolishing of walking delegates and "lazy lubor leaders," and said if the married men in the unions were given two votes as against one of the unmarried there would

not be so many strikes. A SERMON FOR SOLDIERS.

Chaplain McGuire Talks to Five Compani of the Fourteenth Regiment. Rev. L. McGuire, pastor of the Fifth Avenue M. E.
