His text was from Matthew ix., 26: "Behold that a woman touched the hem of his garment." He said: "It had been a busy day in the life of our Savior, and He was hurrying to the bedside of a dying child, when He felt the touch. Rev. Charles Locke preached last evening at the Smithfield Street M. E. Church on the necessity of religion. He said: "If I have often wondered what would happen if the Christian religion were overthrown; if Christ should ever be sacrificed and His blood not shed, what would become of our Republic at the downfall of religion, which first announced liberty? There never was a nation without religion of some sort to fix the moral status and designate the right and the wrong. When heathen infidelity takes the throne philanthropy will tumble, home and truth will be no more, and in the walls of our churches nothing will be heard but the shouting of heathen shouting, and the alien, spiritual anarchists. But we need not despair, for such a day will never come."
