Wheat Weak All Day-Corn Opens Strong. but on Bearish News and Poor Wheat Market Suffers a Slump-Oats and Provisions Follow Corn.

CHICAGO-Wheat opened a shade higher than it closed yesterday, in sympathy with the strength in corn; but the appreciation was quickly lost under the influence of the bearish news of the day. The most potent piece of news was an unconfirmed Paris suble which quoted wheat in that market demoralized and the equivalent of 71%c per bushel lower. The understanding on the Board was that, earlier in the season, when the outlook for the French wheat crop was

at its worst, French speculators had loaded up with futures at high prices; that the subsequent better outlook there, and the evi-dences of a bountiful and fine crop in this country given by the recent receipts of new wheat, together with the recent reduction of wheat, together with the recent reduction of the French import duty, had convinced these speculative holders that their expectations of high prices could not be realized, and that they had, therefore, decided to accept their losses, and had thrown their holdings over-board. 
