The Boom of the Day Before Continued Yesterday-A General Advance-Wheat Closes Nervous and Fluctuating-Hog Products Up, While Hogs Are Down.

CHICAGO-There was another boom in wheat to-day and another advance in prices was scored. The early news was nearly all of a builtsh character. A foreign crop authority gave an estimate of the world's thority gave an estimate of the world's wheat crop, which made the total yield of the year 50,000,000 bushels short of the con-sumptive demand. Paris cables reported an advance of 1 franc on wheat, and 11/2 francs on flour, based on late Russian advices and the fact that the French crop is turning out worse than expected.
