



Parents Starving Their Babe to Death, and Two Children Abandoned.

GREENSBURG, July 30 .- Two terrible cases of cruelty are reported from the vicinity of West Newton, it being alleged that a young couple are deliberately starving a 3-months old habe, the father positively refusing to allow his wife to feed the child. The babe is said to be in a fearfully emach.ted condition. The father insists that no physician shall enter the door, preferring that the little one

should die. The other case is that of James Nicholson whose wife died, a few works ago, leaving two little children, aged 5 and 7 years. Nich-cison has abandoned the children, and, it is alleged, run away with another woman, Both enses are in the bands of Humane Agent

CLOUDS MET AT WILLIAMSPORT.

Parts of the Town Flooded and a Bridge Span Carried Away.

WILLIAMSPORT, July 30 .- A violent wind and rain storm occurred here this afternoon. Two clouds met, and the result was one of the heaviest falls of min this city has known. Portions of the town were flooded two or three feet deep. The storm did much

On the south side of the river, where 35 houses were wholly or partially blown of their foundations, at least one house col-lapsed before the inmates, named Fred-ency, were able to get out. Mrs. Frederacy was rendered insensible, and is still in that condition.






