

CAPTURED IN CANADA.

H. H. Kinney, Who Secured a Note From J. A. Wood & Son,

WILL FIGHT TO STAY WHERE HE IS

Acting Under Advice From His Attorney, Has Little to Say.

CLAIMS HE HAS DONE NOTHING WRONG

H. H. Kinney, the insurance agent who secured a promissory note for \$6,946.25 from Captain John A. Wood, of the firm of John A. Wood & Son, was captured in Toronto, Canada, Thursday.

For a short time Kinney was an agent for the Equitable Life Insurance Company in this city. He was a clever talker, and a genial and entertaining fellow, who bore all the external characteristics of an honest man and a gentleman. Early in July he called upon Samuel L. Wood, the junior member of the firm, representing himself not only as the accredited agent of the Equitable Company, but also as the representative of a strong syndicate of Eastern capitalists. He told a very plausible story, and finally induced the firm to issue their note to him for the sum mentioned in exchange for an insurance policy on the life of Captain Wood for an extravagant amount in proportion to the premium.

WORKED A PLAUSIBLE SCHEME. The policy was to be paid up for a year, and Kinney was also to secure a loan for the Wood firm at a low rate of interest. The note he secured was to cover the insurance premium and Kinney's commission for securing the loan. Kinney accompanied the note Kinney accompanied, and the policy and the mythical syndicate were never heard from.

The police of this city sent out disciplinary orders to the man, and he has been tracked from Pittsburgh to Youngstown, O., and thence to Toronto by way of Buffalo. He registered at a good hotel in Toronto under the name of George A. Clark, of New York.

KINNEY REFUSES TO TALK. Last evening THE DISPATCH received the following special from its representative in Toronto:

"H. H. Kinney, since his arrest on Thursday, acting on the advice of his lawyer, R. G. Smith, has been very reticent concerning the charges against him. In an interview with your representative all he would say was that he was innocent of any crime for which he could be extradited, and that the transaction concerning bills was perfectly legitimate. He registered at the Commercial Hotel under the name of George A. Clark, and explains his registration of a false name by saying it was simply to prevent prying friends from bothering him. The lawyer, who is excellent, refuses to speak on the case. Kinney only had about \$20 in his possession when arrested, but there appears to be ample means at his disposal for defense. He is confident that he will be made acquainted with the charges against him. A gentleman called on the prison today and informed the guards that every comfort would be provided for the prisoner during his incarceration. He is in excellent spirits, and is expected to depart after his return from the police court, where he had mixed with drunks and vagrants."
