The machinery and cranes needed were of a specific make, and it was discovered that, to postpone the improvements until patterns for the necessary machinery could be made, the first of the 6,000 ten order could not be delivered on time. Everything that was needed could be purchased abroad, and with the duty figured in the cost, it is said the machinery has been delivered about as cheap as it could have been made here, and the firm will have the additional advantage of being able to begin to make and deliver the armor plates at the time specified in the contract. All the machinery is here and is being put in place. Five carloads arrived within the last ten days. In this lot was included three large cranes and other implements and tools for handling the material.

The importation of this material led to an inquiry into the extent to which this and other firms import.
