## MR. DALZELL'S REPLY.

-Regrets That the Letter of the Latter Was Made Public Before Reaching Him -Wants a Fair Fight. Hon. John Dalzell's letter to Senator Robinson was made public yesterday. It was written Tuesday, but the writer ex-

plained that he did not feel justified in allowing the letter to become public until after it had been received by Mr. Robinson. The following is the letter:

PITTSBURG, August 25, 1891. Hon. Juo. B. Robinson, Media:

Pittsburg, August 25, 1891.

Hon. Jno. B. Robinson, Media:

Dean Sin.—A copy of a letter addressed to me by you appeared in the Pittsburg papers this mornfng. A copy of the same letter reached me later in the day through the postofflee. I join with you in the regret that you must feel that a private letter, written in the interest of harmony, should thus have been purloined and made public property before reaching the party to whom it was written, and I will cheerfully lend you any nid in my power in bringing to justice those who were guilty of such an unseemly act.

No more signal proof of the truth of this proposition could be found than is farnished by the history of the pending contest for the Presidency of the State League. Under its impulse clubs have been organized in numerous places where up till this time apathy has prevailed. The State League will meet at Seranton stronger in numbers, more thorough in organization, more enthusiastic in zeal and better equipped to enter upon a battle for Republican victory than it has ever been before.

Your indorsement of the candidates named by the late Republican convention at Harrisburg meets my hearty approval, and so do your scattiments with respect to harmony in the party and success for the State ticket.

The suggestion made by implication in your letter that two Republicans cannot contest within their party for a place of honor in its gift without endangering party harmony strikes me as very novel, and fails to appeal to my judgment. All experience proves that honorably conducted contests within party lines are the most effective methods of strengthening the party organization.

In my humble judgment the issue now perding is not as to the choice of one candidate over another. It is a higher, broader and more far reaching issue. It involves the interrity of the League itself, wrapped up, as it is, in the determination of the question whether the representatives of a minority of the cluss of the Commonwealth can gag the majority.

Neither your retirement from the field, nor mine, nor the retirement of both, can

nor mine, nor the retirement of both, can eliminate from the contest this vital issue. I propose to remain in the fight until this question is determined. If discord results from the Scranton convention they will be responsible for it and they only who have attempted to control its actions by unfair methods.

But even if my intentions were different, I could not give my assent to the extraordinary suggestions of your letter, that you and I and a third party should choose a President for the State League. I place too high an estimate on the manhood of the Republican club men of the State to believe that they would tamely submit to dictation from anyone. from anyone.
