AX MAKERS ARE OUT.

Five Great Factories of One Company Involved, Including

## A LARGE ONE AT BEAVER FALLS.

The Trouble Begins at Lewistown Over Non-Union Material.

### MINOR NEWS FROM THE THREE STATES

[SPECIAL TELEGRAMS TO THE DISPATCH]. BEAVER FALLS, Aug. 27 .- The trouble existing for some days past between the ax makers in the Beaver Falls shops of the American Ax and Tool Company and the company culminated to-night in the men notifying Superintendent Charles Hubbard that they would work no longer. Orders were then issued to draw the fires, and tomorrow the works will be idle. Almost 290 men are thus thrown idle.

The American Ax and Tool Company is composed of 13 shops in different parts of the country. Five of these shops-those in Beaver Falls, Cleveland, Lewistown, Pa., East Doughlass and Ralston, N. Y .- are main shops. Lewistown has been out on a strike since July 3, and to-morrow Cleveland, East Doughlass and Ralston will follow Beaver Fails and go out. Lewistown went out because the company wanted them to use steel made by a non-union mill, and the other shops are going out to sustain their Lewistown brethren. The strike will render 1,200 men idle all together, but it is said that it will not inconvenience the company, as there are other branches which can easily fill all orders. It is alleged that the Amalgamated Association is at the bottom of the trouble and will assist the strikers.

## LOOKING TO ANOTHER STRUGGLE.

#### A Convention of the United Mine Workers of the Coke Regions Called.

SCOTTDALE, Aug. 27 .- For the first time since the great coke strike a convention of the United Mine Workers has been called. The Secretary, C. M. Parker, is now sending a call to all the locals in the district, which sets forth that the convention will be open to unorganized as well as organized em-ployes. It will be held here on Labor Day-The labor leaders are very reticent as to

the object of the convention, and it is thought by some to get things into shape for another straggie. A great deal of secret work has been going on in the region.


## He Was Caught Almost in the Act of Start-

-The authorities of Kiel have been in-structed to prevent the new Chilean warship Presidente Pinto from shipping a crew or war material from that port.

-An accommodation train on the St. Paul and Duluth Rallroad was detailed at fall speed near Grantsburg, Minn., Wednesday, but only four passengers were hurt. -Texas milrond employes are up in arms method a speeding reduction in charges






