The nearer the city, the cheaper can the farm be started, and \$100 capital would be abundant to start one in a Mt. Washington coal pit, as the fuel necessary to keep the proper temperature could be gotten at land in the pits and for nothing, there being enough slack left in these disused mines to carry on this industry for half a century at least. In old times the operators left the greater part of the slack in the pits; as it did not pay to take it out, there being next to not pay to take it out there being next to no market for it. The mushroom raiser is not necessarily compelled even to buy seed, as he can manufacture it himself, and the process is so simple that any child can understand it. The spawn for a large mushroom "farm" need not cost more than \$5.

It is more than probable that Mr. Robinson's failure was caused by some very slight inadvertence, as an experienced cultivator, who made a pile of money in the business, states that after consulting all the authorities on the subject, he labored two years before he produced a single mushroom, and finally on a patient examination of the authorities be discovered in a single sentence the cause of all his failures. It rend: "Be careful to delay the covering with mould until 10 or 12 days after the bed has been spawned." In all his attempts be had put the two-inch covering of soil on the spawn as soon as it was planted, thereby raising the temperature by confining the steam to such a degree as to destroy the spawn. This man who had raised every kind of garden vegetable that could be raised in the latitude of New York City, states that mushrooms paid far better than anything else, though his net profit on an acre of celery was \$735, receipts being \$1,340 and expenditures of all kinds, including cost of selling, \$655.

Be it enacted by the Burgess and the Town Councils of the borough of Glenfield, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that no person or persons from the date of the adoption and passage of this ordinance be permitted to run wheelbarrows, bicycles, velocipedes, wagons, carts or sleds over or upon the walks or pavements along public roads or streets.
Sec. 2. Any person or persons who wilfully violate this ordinance shall, upon conviction before the Burgess or Justice of the Peace of said borough, on first offense, pay a fine of one (\$100) dollar, together with all cost of suit and collection of fine. Upon conviction on second and all succeeding offenses the fine shall be not less than five (\$500) dollars, nor more than \$20, together with cost of suit and collection of dine.
Sec. 3. That the Street Committee of said Borough Council are authorized to proceed and enforce the terms of this ordinance within their discretion.
