Great Rush of Pupils to Get Into the

New Industrial School. THE OBJECTS TO BE ATTAINED.

Occupation of the Fathers of the Children Under Instruction.

AN IMPROVED EXAMINATION SYSTEM

The Slove industrial school at the Forber school is to be a very popular department if the rush of pupils is an indication. The classes are now all formed, eight from the Forces school and two each from the normal and commercial departments of the High School. The four latter classes took their initial lesson last Friday, and will receive instruction but once a week; those of the Forbes school will have two a week. There are 156 pupils in all, the oldest reported is 17 years, a boy of the commercial department,

years, a boy of the commercial department, of the High School.

All the hoys of the Forbes school wanted to enter and in the drawing of lots, which was the means employed for selection, it happened that in two classes out of three, brothers were entitled to enter. Of course, this could not be allowed when so many were anxious to be enrolled, so those in authority, after consultation with the fathers of the children, decided the elder ones should be the lucky ones. When this ultimatum was made known to the younger brothers they cried heartily. Superintendent Luckey states that since the school started not a boy has been late or absent. This record for boys, always anxious to get a day "off," is remarkable.

The Object of the School.

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Superintendent Luckey, in speaking about the Sloyd school yesterday, said: "It is a mistaken idea for our people to think that it is a regular trades school and will turn out skillful mechanics. Its object is to educate the youthful hands to do almost anything. The colleges turn out scholars, but their bands are useless. They cannot make a living with them. Rowing is about the only thing they are taught to do." He says the school will make artisans from among its pupils fully as much as the college or university makes the professional man, and that while it cannot bring the pupil up to the maximum of ability it will at least discover his bent and give him such ideas as will eventually discover for him ideas as will eventually discover for him that occupation or line of trade that is best suited to his ideas and capabilities. The eye is trained as well as the hand, the pupil first sketches what is to be made in the school workshop and from this sketch makes the article.

the article.

The course includes two years. The amount of lumber used during the year is about 500 feet at a cost of \$25. The teacher gets a salary of \$500, so this moderate expense is an excellent investment for the Pittsburg schools. The fathers of the 156 children in attendance at the school are divided by occupation as follows: Laborers, 24; skilled laborers, 48; professional men. 9; merohanis, 15; clorks, 25; mechanics, 14; manufacturers, 6. Seventeen of the children are orphans. If this school is a success, which it undoubtedly will be, a similar workshop will be established in the various ward schools.

A New System of Examinations,

Prof. J. M. Logan, of the Peebles school, the originator of a valuable idea, which he would like to see carried out in the schools, and the "lobbying" he did yesterday among the principals showed that they, too, saw much good in his plan. Prof. logan is of the opinion that no teachers in city better understood their work than teachers of the High School classes in the ward schools, simply because they are always on the lookout for examination papers from other schools and all sources lways on the lookout for examination apers from other schools and all sources ossible, that they can give as a test to their apils, and the work throughout the city in his grade is uniform. Not so with the other reales, for the grade of study for the schools astumily can give but a limited idea of its requirements. So the Professor would like to have the principals divided into committees for the studies where written examinations are feasible, who would prepare examination papers that would be distributed all through the schools. The examination need not be for promotion, but more in the suggestive work, making the teachers cognizant of the work of their g.ades all through the city. The examination to occur every ten weeks. In this way the teachers would have a better idea of what is required of their grade and the work would be majorn throughout the city.


