#### IT STOPPED FLOWING,

THE SHORT LOT WELL SUDDENLY CEASES TO SPOUT PETROLEUM.

Condition of the Wells in the Southwest Fields-Several in the Gordon Sand-Gauges of the Big Wells-Estimated Production 26,000 Barrels.

McDonald-A new terror faces the pro ducers in this field. It seems that at any time the big wells are liable to suddenly stop flowing. Late Saturday night Le-Comte & Vallilee's well on the Short lot, which up to that time had been making 25 barrels an hour, suddenly ceased to flow, and since then has not voluntarily produced a barrel of oil. This well came in over two months ago. It is located in the borough of McDonald, and has produced nearly 100,000 barrels of oil. It is located only 200 feet southwest of the Royal Gas Company's No. 3 on the Sauters farm which came at the rate of 1,120 barrels an hour, and at the time was the biggest well in the southwest. It was sponed by deeper drilling, and a short time after it completely ceased to flow as suddenly as Le Comte & Vallilee's well, and what caused this complete and sudden cessasion is yet a mystery. The Royal Gas Company's well was drilled through the sand but Le Comte & Vallilee's producer had not been touched. Greenlee & Forst expected to get the Gordon sand in their No. 1 in the Mevey farm late last night. Their No. 2 is still fishing at 1,400 feet, No. 3 was cased yesterday; No. 4 is down 1,200 feet, and No. 5 is drilling at 1,400 feet, McGee Bros. & Co. shot their well on the Fullick lot. It bridged over 200 feethrom the bottom and wrenched off the connections. After the damage had been repaired and the toole run, it made a 45-burrel flow. The Royal Gas Company's well on the sauters property, east of the railroad and one location northeast of the Fanny Johnson well, was 15 feet above the fifth sand last night. Haymaker & Co. are down 1,400 feet on the Toward lot; 1,000 feet on the Baupree lot; 700 feet on the Hoffman lot, and Thompson, Haymaker & Co. layve a rig upon the Bess lot, and their well on the Irons lot is making 15 barrels an hour. Mr. R. Haymaker has started a well on McConahy farm, two miles southwest of McDouald, on a 45° line. Dybert & Co. are down 1,200 feet on the Johns lot, below the station. They had to plug the hole on the scott lot, in the northwestern part of the borough, and move the rig. They are now down 700 feet. Rohand & Co., ou the McLain lot, have gotten the stem out of the hole and will drill past the tools. They are just on top of the fifth sand. The People's Gas Company's well on the Davison lot is due in the fifth sand Friday, as is the Devonian oil Company's No. 2 on the Fayall near the Marrie McDonald or rocerty burned Sunday. deeper drilling, and a short time after i completely ceased to flow as suddenly the fifth sand Friday, as is the Devonian oil Company's No. 2 on the Fayall near the Mary Robb well. Miller & Co.'s rig on the Margie McDonald property burned Sunday. The following shows an hourly gauge of the big wells yesterday.
