CHOICE PROPERTIES

Who Have Been Driven to These Shores by the Cruel Russians.

A NATIONAL COMMITTEE FORMED

To Care for the Unfortunate Refugees When They Arrive Here.

HOMES AND EMPLOYMENT TO BE FOUND

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.) NEW YORK, Sept. 22.-Representative Hebrews from all parts of the United States met to-day in conference at the new Hebrew Institute building and formulated plans for the "reception, placing and dis-tribution of the Russian Hebrew refugees." Among those present were Jesse Seligman, Oscar Strauss, Judge Isaacs, President of the Baron Hirsch fund trustees; Simon Wolf, ex-Minister to Roumania; Canovan Levy and Jacob M. Schiff. The following officers were elected; Louis Seasongood, a Cincinnati millionaire, Permanent Chair-man; Lazarus Silverman, of Chicago, First Vice President; Joseph Fox, of New York, Second Vice President; A. S. Solomon, of Washington, and Bernhard Harris, of Philadelphia, Secretaries.

The session opened with a general state-ment by a New York delegate of the present condition of the Russian Hebrews. According to this the refugees have been arriving at the scaport towns on the Atlantic coast at the rate of 10,000 a month for nearly a year, and the evidence obtainable indicated that there would be no decrease for some time. Mr. Schiff was applauded when he said that whatever the cause of their coming, the Hebrews of the United States could not refuse to receive these poor people, who had been driven from their homes and denied a refuge everywhere else. Hitherto Hebrews of the seaboard cities had been compelled to bear the bur-den of receiving and supporting these un-fortunates, and it was absolutely necessary that their co-religionists in other parts of that their co-fengionists in other parts of the country should lend a helping hand. A committee was appointed to frame the principles of the new National organiza-tion, which it was decided was necessary

tion, which it was decided was necessary to carry on the work. A resolution was finally drawn up which satisfied all. This resolution declared that the new body shall be known as the American Committee for Ameliorating the Condition of the Russian Hebrews. This body consists of the delegates present to-day and the presidents of all other Hebrew societies hitherto exist-Recognition is accorded to all the synagogues and branches of Hebrew societies and to all persons, "trrespective of creed," who sympathize with the refugees. The chairman was authorized to appoint an executive committee of 25, to have control of the machinery of the organization. This committee will have its headquarters in New York. It was decided to secure employment and homes for he immigrants, "preferably in districts not largely populated; to give them instruction in English and agricultural and mechanical employments."

Letters expressing sympathy for the refugees were read. They included one from Governor Russell, of Massachusetts, Congressman Greenleaf, of Rochester, and Chairman of the State Board of Arbitration, William Purcell.
