Telegrams were at once dispatched to the officials of the St. Paul and Duluth Railroad to stop the limited train going east at Finlayson and hold it until the women and children of the town could be sent away. This was done. By 4 c'clock the flames had reached the outskirts of the village, and the male members of the families commenced the work of saving the buildings. 
