# IS BEARISH, AS USUAL.

The Monthly Oil Report Shows Great Results in the Southwest.

## DECLINE IN THE UPPER FIELDS.

## McDonald and Vicinity Still the Axis of the Producing World.

## LATE GAUGES FROM THE BIG WELLS

The monthly statement of work in the oil fields for September is essentially a report of activity in the southwest. It is bearish from beginning to end. There has been more remarkable report formulated during the present year. The average production of September wells is 63 burrel which is lighter than for any mouth since New Year. In August the average was only 403 barels. In the Southwest district the com-deted wells averaged 1231-5 barrels each. This, however, includes 26 dry holes. There were 129 wells finished and without countng the dusters the balance of 103 averaged 154% barrels to the well. It has been 1541<sub>4</sub> barrels to the well. It has been a wonderful month for new production. Putting it at the lowest possible estimate the total new production for all of the fields has increased from 13,536 to 17,926 barrels, a net increase of 4,390 barrels. The southwest district alone pumped from 11,000 to 15,890 barrels, or a net increase of 4,890 barrels. This shows a decrease of 500 har-rels in new production in the upper fields. In all the fields there is a decrease of 48 in the number of wells completed in September to those finished in August, and in the southwest there is a decrease of 14 completed wells, although a much larger increase in new production than in August. There were 62 dry holes reported altogether, which is a decrease of one, but in the southwest there were only 25 dusters completed, a decrease of nine. The above gives a good idea of the bearish situation in the field. Now for the new work.

#### Progress of the New Work.

This makes a small hole on the other side of the account. There is a net decrease of 31 in the number of rigs. The total number of drilling wells remains the same, 40. The Southwest, however, must be considered. In this prolitic territory there is an in-In this product territory there is an in-crease of 29 drilling wells over the num-ber which were reported for Angust. These will without doubt bring up the new production for October, as the majority of them are located in the heart of the richest spots of the McDonald field. There is a document of the dwing Sentember in the decrease of 16 during September in the number of rigs. There are only 73 strings where there were 89 in August. This is nearly half of the total number reported, 157, in all of the fields.

A glance at the reports from Bradford and Allegany shows a decrease in new pro-duction from 220 to 202 barrels, and a decrease from 36 to 33 completed wells. There were two dry holes in September and none in August. The new production in the Middle Field has dropped from 182 to 105 barrels with a drop to 18 from 34 in wells completed. The same state of affairs exists in Venango and Clarion where the new production fell from 535 to 447 barrels, and completed wells from 76 to 51. Dry holes increased from 17 to 22, Batler & Armstrong had an increase in completed wells from 44 to 54, but they fuiled to respond as before, and the new production dropped from 1,593 to 1,246 arrels

The above statement proves conclusively that the only spot that can have any at-traction for the operator this fall is Mc-Donald and its northeastern neighbors, Noblestown, Onkdale and McCurdy. When the Southwest is spoken of nowadays these fields are the only ones meant, as they con-stitute about the whole of the southwest dis-





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
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
