

BRIGGS' TRIAL TO-DAY.

The Famous Heresy Case Will Come to a Hearing This Morning.

EARLY CONCLUSION LOOKED FOR.

The Issues Involve the Divine Origin of the Scriptures.

PROTESTANTISM AS A WHOLE AT STAKE

(SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.) NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—New York Presbytery assembly to-morrow in the old Scotch Church, in Fourteenth street, to begin the most important trial in the history of Protestantism. The Rev. Dr. Charles Augustus Briggs is to be arraigned on charges of heresy. The importance of this trial is due to the fact that the issues involve the inspiration, authenticity, infallibility, character and influence of the Holy Bible. The popular idea that the Bible is the word of God, written under His direct influence, upon which rests the religious belief of many millions of people, against the scholars and critics' theory that the Scriptures are human writings, characterized by the same mistakes and inventions of other human writings, and differing from them in the divine element in degree only, is one of the issues. And the other, as less important, is the force and effect upon ordained ministers of their vows of subscription to the Church standards, which form the basis of all religious communions.

There have been three other great Presbyteries heretofore tried in America within the century. But the doctrines involved were trifling in comparison with those in the Briggs case. Thomas S. Craighead, a Kentucky preacher, was tried in 1812 on charges of heresy, developed at the beginning of the century views antagonistic to the famous Calvinistic decrees of 1820. There were trials with convictions in the lower courts, with appeals and reversals, disquieting the Church greatly for many years, until the death of Craighead put an end to the case, just as the General Assembly was about to pass judgment against him.

Toward the middle of the century Alfred Barnes, the famous commentator, was tried for heresy by the Philadelphia Synod. His offense was a denial of the Calvinistic doctrine of the imputation of sin through Adam's fall and of righteousness through Christ's sacrifice. The case was heard in Synod and also in General Assembly, where it resulted in Dr. Barnes' acquittal. The history of this case is the most amazing theological struggle ever witnessed. Then came the case of David Swing at the close of the third quarter of the century. Dr. Swing's preaching was of the humanitarian sort and not at all up to the Calvinistic standards of Princeton College. Dr. Francis L. Patton pressed the charges of unevangelical preaching against the eminent Chicago divine, with little energy and force for which he has since become famous.

ACQUITTED BY PRESBYTERY. An acquittal in the Chicago Presbytery by a vote of 45 to 15 was the first result of this trial. Five days after came Dr. Swing's resignation, and in October of 1874 the Synod of Northern Illinois reviewed the testimony taken in Presbytery and found that he ought to have been convicted.

Each of these trials was had upon charges preferred by individuals. The prosecution in the case of Dr. Briggs is the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America. This was the first victory for the opposition. Dr. Charles M. Birch, a Pennsylvania, and valdicatorian in 1858 of Washington College, began the movement against Dr. Briggs upon the appearance of the famous inaugural address on the authority of Holy Scripture. Although Dr. Birch was a theologian and a student, he took offense at Dr. Henry Van Dyke and Dr. S. H. Spalding, who were in the audience, and the address was ordered by Presbytery, and a committee favorable to Dr. Briggs was appointed for the purpose. Young Dr. Van Dyke, a warm supporter of Dr. Briggs, refused to serve on the committee. Another liberal man on the committee was Dr. Birch, who captured the committee, bringing in a report recommending a judicial inquiry.

When the vote on this report was taken Dr. Briggs' friends remained away from Presbytery, and it was by a vote numbering about one-fourth of the voting force of Presbytery. Then came the veto at Detroit by the General Assembly, in which the conduct of Dr. Briggs' friends was characterized by the same halting disposition.

THE PROGRAMME FOR TO-DAY. In pursuance of the action of Presbytery, the indictment against Dr. Briggs is to be read to-morrow. According to the rule of the Church, no case is to be heard for ten days. In the trial to be proceeded to in the afternoon, the Presbytery will hear the charges and specifications against Dr. Briggs. But there is every prospect of an immediate conclusion of the case to-morrow in Presbytery in a manner that cannot fail to be unsatisfactory to the Church at large.

Dr. John Hall, of the Fifth Avenue Church, has advanced as the advocate of peace, and has counseled and urged the Presbytery to quiet Dr. Briggs' accusers and to drop the case. Last summer before his departure for Europe, Dr. Hall urged this course for the sake of harmony in the Church, and for his return to his native country. But the case is every prospect of an immediate conclusion of the case to-morrow in Presbytery in a manner that cannot fail to be unsatisfactory to the Church at large.

DE HALL'S MANY ESCAPES. Another thing whose avoidance is greatly to be desired is the necessity of voting on the merits of the case. This Dr. Hall especially feels, as he has carefully arranged his business in such a manner that his absence from places where this duty is required of him. He escaped by a few hours the vote in Presbytery last May; by a few minutes the vote in Union Seminary last June, and altogether, by resigning his commission, the vote in General Assembly at Detroit.

The member of Presbytery who has felt the effects of Dr. Hall's pleading is Colonel John J. McCook, of the prosecution committee, an elder in his church. At the sitting of Dr. Hall's session Friday night, when a successor to Presbyter McCook was to be elected, efforts were made to elect a Briggs man to the place. Mr. Robert Briggs was chosen Presbyter and Mr. John Stouffer his alternate. Both are anti-Briggs men, and the Fifth Avenue Church will be represented again in Presbytery by a conservative elder.

Another man who is giving the conservatives trouble is Dr. Charles S. Robinson, of Union Book Lane. Dr. Robinson was bitter against Dr. Briggs at the May meeting of the Presbytery, but since he has been elected, he has undergone a change of heart, and his influence is now cast with the peace party. In the Fifth Avenue Church recently elected Dr. Robinson's hymnal for its services, the influence of Dr. Hall with his brother Presbyter may account for the change of sentiment.

RAILROAD MEN'S TROUBLES

To Receive Careful Consideration This Week at the Brotherhood Convention. GALESBURG, Ill., Oct. 4.—The annual convention of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen of the United States and Canada opens here at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning. Representatives of the larger part of 424 lodges are already here. The three principal issues to come before the convention are relative to the discharge of the Grand Trustees by Grand Master S. E. Wilkinson, the discharge of the switchmen on the Northwestern road and the election of officers. F. M. McNeely, the Northwestern Grandmaster at Chicago, and the Trainmen's Executive Committee, that system are here to explain that difficulty to the convention. Grand Chief Conductor E. E. Clark, of the Order of Railway Conductors, is present and sustains the position taken by Grand Master Wilkinson, and disapproves the action taken by the Supreme Council in expelling the trainmen.

Mr. J. S. Coffin, of Iowa, arrived last night to advocate the necessity of automatic couplers for cars and Sunday rest for railway employees. So far as the switchmen's trouble is concerned it is likely that the convention will sustain the action of the Grand Master. The latter part of the week some action may be taken on the federal question, but this will depend on the action taken at the meeting here at Cedar Rapids of the committees of the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors and Order of Railway Conductors on the proposition of a union of the two organizations.
