

MINERS GET EXCITED

Over a Report From a Coal Operator That Forty Miners Are

WORKING AT THE OLD RATES.

A New Piano and Organ Factory to Be Built at Kensington.

MISCELLANEOUS INDUSTRIAL ITEMS

Considerable excitement was stirred up last evening when the announcement was made that about 40 out of 72 mines in the Pittsburgh district were at work at the old rates. This information was given out by W. A. Black, Secretary of the Charities Valley Coal Company. The list furnished by him follows:

Fairfield Railroad-Midway, Bank Diamond, Primrose, Jumbo, Willow Grove, Allison and W. P. Bend & Co.'s Miller's Run mines; Baltimore and Ohio-Easton, Watery, Fort Revere and Scott's Ocean mines; Pittsburgh, McKeesport and Youghiogheny-Dar, Bonning and Whitestown; Pittsburgh, Virginia and Charleston-Acme, Allen, Redstone, Smoak and Lynn mines; Pennsylvania Railroad-the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal Company, four mines; the Penn Gas Coal Company, seven mines; Westmoreland Coal Company, four mines; Hampton, Piquette, Springhill, F. L. Stevenson and Cleary's C. O. mines.

FURTHER CLAIMS BY OPERATORS. Mr. Black continued his information to the effect that the mines working are running only to yards and local trade. No coal is being mined for the foreign trade except at the old rates. Mr. Black also declared that the New York and Cleveland Company's mines are working at the advance, and says that all the mines mentioned above are in operation at the old rates.

When this information was given out it spread like wildfire throughout the mining district. The men along the lines of railway affected by the strike hurried away to the mines to learn what truth there was in the statement. President Costello started on a personal investigation and before 10 o'clock last night he had reports from his subordinates in every direction. The number in which the miners were working and the confidence expressed by the operators indicated that they thought the strike was broken and that in a few days they could claim a victory over the men. Mr. Costello expressed himself very differently. After hearing from the districts, he said: "Why, I can say that the miners are not working at the Black Diamond mines, a few more may be in the Jumbo mines, but they are not organized. At Scott's Ocean mines there are 12 Hungarians and I am very sure there are no great numbers of those along the Baltimore and Ohio, and those who are on duty are imported."

NOT ALL IN THIS DISTRICT. Besides, all the mines mentioned in Mr. Black's list above West Newton are not in the Pittsburgh district. The mines he mentions on the Pittsburgh, McKeesport and Youghiogheny road are in the Conellsville region, and have no right to be taken into consideration in the local strike. There may be a few more along the Pittsburgh, Virginia and Charleston, but the mines are not in anything like practical operation. As for the seven mines of the Pennsylvania Coal Company, they are not in this district, and I believe we have an agreement that will show how the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal Company is working.

"I want to say in a general way that this is the most complete cessation of work that ever occurred in Pittsburgh. There have always been in the outlying portions of our district a small number of miners whose operators would never concede any price until it was established by the major portion of the district. In nearly all the mines, the coal is of an inferior nature, hence they have seldom ever had the district price. If they ever paid it it was only when the district price was raised. The operators would never refuse to work, finding better remuneration elsewhere."

"The developments will be watched for in the future with great interest."

A VERY STUBBORN FIGHT. The Printers' Strike Narrowing Down to One of Endurance.

The printers' fight still grows more stubborn. Yesterday a new lot of men arrived and the printers, of course, over to their ranks. The fight has now narrowed down to one of endurance and the opposing forces are under the direct leadership of Secretary Knapp, of the Typothetae, and President Present, of the International Typographical Union. Present Smith said yesterday that the employing printers were in very much better shape than they had been at any time since October 1. Secretary Knapp says the Pittsburgh employers are doing better than did those of Chicago, and they won.

The union printers, however, are keeping up spirits, taking encouragement from their gained success in attempts to get the men brought here to leave the city nearly as fast as they came.

A NEW PIANO FACTORY. Kensington to Be the Location of a New and Extensive Business.

A new organ and piano factory will be erected at Kensington. J. Clark Williams has been instrumental in inducing the New York Piano and Organ Company to locate there, and work on the foundations for the building will be completed next week. There will be eight buildings in all, each three stories high. There will be four of them 40x100, and the remaining four will be 50x100.

The building when completed will occupy over 100,000 feet of floor space, and the new plant will employ several hundred men. The plant will be finished as rapidly as possible, and immediately upon its completion work will be begun on it by that time, "sterling" goods will be made.

The validity of the new Constitution of Kentucky is to be contested, on the ground that the Constitutional Convention made numerous changes after the instrument was ratified by the people.

The Canadian Government has not received any intimation that President Roosevelt and Mr. Blake wished the Canadian Government to fix some date between October 25 and December 1 for a conference.

Three men supposed to be implicated in the Woods murder, at Grand Forks, N. D., boarded a train at Fisher Thursday evening and were arrested at Crookston, Minn. While on the way to jail all three escaped and are still at large.

Arrests of prominent civil and military adherents of Balanacene continue. The minor officials are being released. It is the evident intention of the Junta to release many of the political prisoners after the election on October 20.

By an explosion which yesterday morning in a mine at Rich Hill, Mo., Riley Metz was killed and Amos Alger seriously wounded. Half a dozen miners were killed and about \$5,000 damage done. A rescuing party had a close call, being overcome by choke damp.
