One Hundred Millions More Goods Were Imported Free of Duty.

THE GOOD LIFFECT OF RECIPROCITY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 .- The Bureau Statistics of the Treasury Department has made public a report of great value upon the foreign commerce of the United States for some arative periods under the old and new tariffs.

During the 11 months from October 1. 1890, to August 31, 1891, under the new tariff, the total value of our foreign commerce, imports and exports combined, was \$1,603,782,206, an increase of \$74,768,639 over the value of our foreign commerce during the prior corresponding periods. The average annual increase of our foreign commerce from 1871 to 1891, was \$33,314,352. It will be observed the increase during the first II months under the new tariff, was nearly

double this average annual increase. In the 11 months ending August 3!, 1891. the value of our imports was \$763,210,965, an increase of \$25,681,316 over the imports of the corresponding months of the prior the corresponding months of the prior periods. The value of exports, \$840,571,301, an increase of \$49,687,323 over prior years. The value of the imports, free of duty, during 11 months ending August 31, 1891, was \$364.661,336, an increase of \$112,013,081 during the first 11 months under the new

INCREASE IN FREE IMPORTS.

During these 11 months, 47 58 per cent of the total imports were free of duty, for the corresponding menths of the prior year, 34.27 per cent were free, an increase of 13.71 in the per centage of free goods imported under the new tariff. The value of imports res of duty during the fiscal year 1890 was \$265,668,629, the largest in any year in the history of our commerce. The value of free imports for the first 11 months under the new tariff was \$98,992,707 greater than for the year 1890, and \$108,174,258 greater

It should also be considered, that sugar, a crincipal article of import, both in quanti-ies and value, was not admitted free until April 1, 1891, and from that date the value, as well as the percentage of merchandise admitted free of duty, has been greatly in-creased. Of the value of all imports for the five months from April 1 to August 31, 1891, 55.75 per cent was free of duty. This is much the largest per cent in the imports of merchandise free of duty in the entire history of the Government.

During the corresponding five months of 1890 the value of the imports was \$356,234,-This shows an increase in the value of free merchandise of \$82,012,053 or of 22,48 per cent during the five months ending August 21, 1891, over the corresponding period of 1899.

QUITE A NOTABLE YEAR. It may be noted that the total value of the imports for the eleven months, \$763,-210,965, exceeded in value the imports of

any year in the history of our Government excepting the fiscal year 1890, when their value was \$789,310,400. If, however, the imports of September, 1891, equal those of August, the total imports will largely exneed those of 1890.

The total receipts from customs during the last quarter of 1889 and the three-quar-ters of 1890, ending September 30, were Sunt 1998 492 45. The enstores receipts dur ing the same quarters of 1890 and 1891 were \$196,302,066 96. This shows during the year a reduction in the customs revenue of

THE TARIFF DID IT. \$41,396,425 49, notwithstanding the large in crease of imports. The principal article of our imports from which the duty was re-moved is sugar, and by the provisions of the new tariff law the removal of this duty did not take effect until April 1, 1891. During the two quarters since that date

the reduction in customs revenue as com-pared with the same period of the prior year amounted to \$41,780,294 12. EXPORTS LARGELY INCREASED. The value of exports under the new tariff during the first 11 months ending August 31, 1891, was \$840,571,391, an increase of \$49,087,323 over the exports of like merchandise for the corresponding 11 months of the prior year while the old tariff was in force. This increase was nearly 21/2 times greater than the annual average increase of exports during the 20 years prior to 1891, which was \$20,750,425.

which was \$20,750,425.

During the same II months of 1890-91 the value of the exports has exceeded the value of the imports by \$77,360,336. The importance of the excess of export over imports is conspicuous when compared with the excess of exports of the fiscal year 1890, when it was \$68,518,275. In 1889 the imports ex-ceeded the exports \$2,730,277. In 1888 the balance against us was still larger, the im-

ports exceeding exports \$28,022,607. The increase in value of our exports is large and gratifying. The value of our exports for the 11 months ending August 31. 1891, exceeds the value of the exports for any year in the history of our commerce excepting the fiscal years 1881 and 1890. The value of our exports for the 12 months ending August 31, 1891, was \$909,264,438, or in round numbers, about \$7,000,000 greater than any previous fiscal year.

EFFECT OF RECIPROCITY. Of reciprocity, the report says that "it is opening new markets and increasing the demand for our products. The year ending June 30, 1891, showed an increase in the ex-ports to Brazil of \$2,146,77?. The treaty with Brazil went into effect April 1, last, and it is not to be expected that the results

will be very marked as yet.

During the menth of August last alone. compared with August, 1890, the increase in values of exports to Brazil was \$702,903. Our trade with Brazil will doubtless contime to largely increase. The reciprocity treaties with Santo Domingo and with Spain concerning trade relations with Cuba and Puerto Rico did not go into effect until September 1, and as yet there are no available statistics to show the effects of the treaties upon our commerce. These will appear later on and will probably show an increased demand for our products.

During the year ending June 30, 1891, the value of our imports of merchandise was: From Cuba, \$61,714.395; Puerto Rico, \$3,-164,110; Santo Domingo, \$1,610,360 During the same period the value of our exports to these same countries was: To

Cuba. \$12,224 888; Puerto Rico, \$2,155,234; Santo Domingo, \$1,023,751. Our imports from these islands consist principally of sugar and molasses, tobacco and manufactures of, and fruits and nuts.
