Opening of the October Term of the U. S. District Court To-Morrow.

A Murderer Sent to the Reformatory Instead of to the Pen.

OTHER WORK OF YESTERDAY'S COURTS

The October term of the United States District Court will open to-morrow in Pittsburgh. Judge Reed will preside. There are 38 criminal cases to be tried, in addition to the true bills which may be returned by the grand jury. Most of the cases are for counterfeiting and violation of the postal laws. PUT OUT OF HARM'S WAY.

Some Severe Sentences Handed Down in Criminal Court Yesterday.

The following sentences were imposed in the Criminal Court yesterday.

Michael Schaeffer, voluntary manslaughter, for the killing of Patrick Finan, sent to the Reformatory. A broken heart, and his sentence, not being to the penitentiary, was therefore more pleasing to him. Leonard Hill, voluntary manslaughter, for the killing of Leonard Hilton, eight years to the penitentiary; Frank Burns, larceny, six months to the workhouse; Joseph Linton, receiving stolen goods, 90 days to the workhouse; D. H. Rhodes, vagrancy, 18 months to the workhouse; Thomas Reagan, attempted assault, 90 days to the workhouse; William Roeder, attempted assault, sentence suspended; Katie Kreskel, larceny, 30 days to the workhouse; Frank Harold, 18 months to the workhouse; Martin Towey, entering building, etc., 30 days to the workhouse; Charles Schuler, felonious assault and battery, \$25 and costs; Thomas Lee, aggravated assault and battery, five months to the workhouse; William Sankay, accessory after the fact to the murder of Patrick Finan, 30 days to the workhouse.

Continued Objections to Oil Wells.

Lewis Hille, the owner of a farm in Bellevue borough, yesterday entered a bill in equity against Robert Heber, Stephen Lewis, George Weaver et al, to restrain them from proceeding with drilling an oil well on the property of Mrs. Robert Davis. It is alleged the drillings and salt water flow down on the property of the plaintiff and pollute a stream of water on his farm.

Setting a Partnership.

A bill in equity was filed yesterday by Peter Routh for an accounting of the partnership between himself and Charles W. Meeks, William N. Wilson and Lucien Dietrich. The parties operated a general store at Mounds, and under their contract the plaintiff was to receive one-fourth the net profits. The firm was dissolved in May last.

Another Murder Trial To-Morrow.

Daniel Reardon will be put on trial to-morrow for the murder of Martin Miley, the boy who was shot in the Twenty-sixth street tunnel last July, and who died some weeks later at the West Penn Hospital. The defendant was one of a crowd of boys who were drinking beer in the tunnel when the shot was fired.

Jack Borden Gets No New Trial.

Amotion for a new trial was made yesterday in the case of Jack Borden, convicted Friday of burglary. It was overruled by the court. Borden was the man whom Mayor Gourley was charged by the papers with attempting to shield, for asking that he be given immunity from arrest if he returned to the city.
