The Young Peoples' Convention in the First United Presbyterian Church, - Allegheny, was continued yesterday. T. J. Gillespie presided. In the afternoon the first address was delivered by Rev. W. R. Wilson, whose subject was "Work in the Congregation,"

He said that a prayer meeting should be all that the name implies. There should be of the country, particularly in the East, praying, and lots of it. People had been talked to death, but no one was ever prayed to death. The idea should be to get everyhody interested, and place upon them some responsibility. This would keep them in-Icrested.

"Work Outside the Congregation" was the topic handled by George M. Paden. He begon with the statement that the work of

all Christians, and particularly the young people, was the evangelization of the world. Meetings of young people could be made interesting by the gleaning of facts about these missions and illustrated pictures of the mission helds. "Work as Individuals" was discussed by

Rev. R. M. Russell. He said that what was most needed in the church to-day is men; persons of individual efficiency. Christ's example should be followed as he was not only an organizer but an individual
