

WEATHER TOO WARM.

That and the Pause Before the Holiday Rush Makes Trade Dull.

FAILURES AND BANK CLEARINGS.

The Condition of Leading Industries During the Past Week.

THE HEAVY IRON OUTPUT CONTINUES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—[Special.]—In reply to special inquiry by Bradstreet's this week, telegraphic reports from the more prominent business centers confirm the analysis of the general trade situation presented last week and point to a widespread check in the movement of staple products.

West and Northwest, mild, and at some points quite unseasonable, weather has checked trading, while from other cities word comes that the bulk of autumn business is over.

There has been no improvement at Boston, except for rubber. At Philadelphia worsted spinners are fairly active but textile manufacturers generally report trade duller from iron business.

There has been no gain at Cincinnati in line with collections slow and reduction of drygoods, notions, clothing and boots and shoes.

Business failures in the United States number 285, against 239 last week and 154 the week before.

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Exports of wheat, including flour as wheat, from both coasts of the United States and Canada this week, as reported to Bradstreet's, equal 2,572,294 bushels, as compared with 2,781,176 bushels the week before.

Staple cottons are generally held firm, and are strong as to prices. Some bleached goods have been reduced 3c.

Law sugar is 1-16c lower on early free sales, but is strong at the close on short European best crop reports.

Bank clearings, as wired to Bradstreet's, are from 64 cities lower this week.

The improvement in business continues. It is greater than before at the West, considerable at the South and clearly perceived at the East.

Changes in the Iron Situation.—The iron industry shows most change. Extreme anxiety to sell pig iron and financial weakness in unexpected quarters, produce a present depression.

QUAKER CITY ART FEATURES.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 30.—[Special.]—In spite of its ugliness, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts is rather an imposing structure, and the site it occupies is one of the best in the Quaker City.

The unbroken regularity of its narrow streets and red brick houses grows extremely tedious, but as one passes up the Academy steps and looks out the fine sweep of North Broad street, one can almost cheat one's self into believing that this is a gay, delightful foreign city.

In the first place, no European town could, or would, tolerate in its chief art gallery such a combination of want of taste and crudity of color as we find in the interior decoration of our Academy.

But a year ago the institution pulled together its resources, and by a special effort succeeded in securing for its annual exhibition a really remarkable collection of paintings, and one which, as far as it is concerned, thereby showing that slow, old Philadelphia is by no means entirely blind to the interests of art.

At once found a purchaser, in spite of the fact that \$6,000 was the sum he asked; and several fine pictures were added to the permanent collection.

Without entering into a discussion of the merits of this question, I may say that the publication of such an article was productive of good in that it called attention to art.


