TRUSTEES' DRESS TALKS. In Denial of the Various Stories Told About Dr. Cyrus Teed. A SIMILARITY IN THEIR BELIEF May Lead to a Closer Relation of Korschans and Economites. THEIR POSITION CLEARLY DEFINED. Duss, of the latter organization, has prepared a statement showing the true situation.

NEW HOTELS COMING. Two Magnificent Structures Are Promised for Pittsburgh. A GREAT WOOD STREET HOSTELRY Talked of by E. M. Ferguson, William Roseburg and Others. OFFERS BEING MADE FOR THE CENTRAL HOTEL. A rumor has been quietly circulated for some days that a new hotel, of impressive proportions, commensurate in every respect with Pittsburgh's needs and commercial importance, was soon to be built on a downtown site.

MUDDLE OVER AN ORGAN. A Strange State of Affairs Awaiting From a Suit Against a Braddock Church—A Very Unusual Opinion Handed Down by Judge Stowe. In the suit of Drake versus Irvine, in Common Pleas Court No. 1, reported in the Pittsburgh Legal Journal, Charles W. Seovel, attorney for plaintiff, scored an interesting point from the fact that Judge Stowe granted it rather grudgingly. The question at issue is where an affidavit of defense admits a part of plaintiff's claim, and as to the rest, sets up a defense insufficient as to part, but good as to the rest, the court has power to order judgment for the part admitted and also for the part not sufficiently denied or defended with leave to plaintiff to proceed to trial for the remainder of his claim.

CAUGHT THE BOROUGH. Right of Way Given on an Offer to Buy the Knoxville Incline. BIRMINGHAM COMPANY IS AHEAD. Another Inclined Plane Is to Be Built on the Southside. A NICE FIGHT FOR THE COURTS. The Pittsburgh and Birmingham Traction Company will apply for a charter for an inclined plane from South Tenth and Bradford streets to the house of Louis Fritz, on Brownsville avenue, on next Monday. This is strange, from the fact that they already control the Pittsburgh and Knoxville and Mr. Oliver's inclined planes, but the explanation was given yesterday by one of the attorneys, Mr. Hays. He said: "The Birmingham Traction Company some time ago made a proposition to the Knoxville people whereby they would take the inclined and build an electric line from Knoxville to the city via the Tenth street bridge and Second avenue. The proposition was accepted and the contract drawn up and signed by the Knoxville people."

Death on Burning Stack. Coroner McDowell received a message from Scott Haven yesterday and another from Boston, on the Pittsburgh, McKeesport and Younghighway Railroad, that an unknown man had been found dead between those two towns yesterday morning, having evidently been suffocated by gas while sleeping on a burning stack pile.
