

SHUT OUT FINALLY.

Amalgamated Carpenters Barred From the Trades Assembly.

SOME CONFLICTING STATEMENTS

Concerning the Character and the Number of the Men in It.

AFFAIRS IN THE INDUSTRIAL WORLD

The meeting of the Trades Assembly Saturday night was attended with some dissatisfaction. The matter of admitting a representative from the Amalgamated Association of Carpenters was again brought up and finally and negatively decided.

Last night Calvin Wyatt, one of the members of the assembly, made the following statement: "Some weeks ago a committee of five from the Trades Assembly was appointed to investigate the right of the Amalgamated to be represented."

The Amalgamated men deny Mr. Wyatt's statement and say there are 1,500 members in the Amalgamated carpenters in Pittsburgh, and will likely work in direct opposition to the Brotherhood.

Fifteen printers from Boston with their families registered at the St. Charles Hotel yesterday. They have come here to work in the job offices, and belong to the Printers Protective Fraternity.

The Executive Committee of the National Barbers Association met in the Monongahela House last night, and fixed January 4 as the time for the national convention.

The Wood's Run Tin Plate Mill will be increased to twice its present size. Twelve printers were induced to give up their positions at the non-union shops yesterday and leave the city.
