NEW YORK, Dec. 2.-The stock market was dull to-day, and while weak in the forenoon developed considerable strength in the late trading, closing strong with a scarcity of stocks offering in all portions of the list. The principal factor in the weakness was the business outlook: "The great and unin-terrupted prosperity of railroad property must speedily lead to greater expenditures by managers of roads, and if so it is hardly necessary to add that this one movement will touch and tend to impart activity to many important industries. 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
