Mr. Stanford's New Colleague is Sworn in and Takes His Seat.

A NAVY TO PROTECT OUR FLAG.

Long List of Presidential Appointments Confirmed Yesterday.

SENATE HOLIDAYS BEGIN TO-MORROW

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 22.—Among the papers presented and referred in the Senate were resolutions of the military order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, adopted at St. Paul, Minn., presented by Mr. Manderson, urging the completion, at the earliest moment practicable, of a "bary sufficient in ships and armament to command and enforce the respect due the flag of this nation the world over."

The House concurrent resolutions for the payment of the December salaries to employees of Congress, on the 24th, inst., and for a holiday recess from to-morrow until Tuesday, January 5 were presented and concurred in, and then, after a short executive session, and as a mark of respect to the memory of the late Representative Ford, of Michigan, whose death during the last recess had been formally communicated from the House, the Senate, at 11 o'clock, adjourned until to-morrow.

A Number of Officials Confirmed. During the executive session the Senate confirmed the following appointments: S. B. Elkins to be Secretary of War; Enos H. Nebecker, of Indiana, United States Treasurer; J. C. Legare, Refiner of the United States Mint at New Orleans; J. C. Quinn,

league, Mr. Felton, advanced to the clerk's desk and took the oath of office for his new Senatorial term. Senator Stanford then introduced his bill of last session appropriating \$300,000 for the extension of the Executive Mansion, in accordance with plans prepared by Mrs. Harrison. He also introduced bills for the erection of public buildings at Fresno, Alameda, San Diego, Oakland and Los Angeles, Cal., and Ogden, Utah. Also his bills of last session appropriating \$1,000,000 for the establishment of a gun factory on the Pacific coast; and to provide the Government with means sufficient to supply the national want of a sound circulating medium.

Senator Tarple introduced a bill appropriating \$1,500,000 for the erection of a public building at Indianapolis. Senator Gibson, of Louisiana, reintroduced, with slight amendments, his bill introduced early in the present session, appropriating \$10,000,000 to improve the navigation and afford safety to commerce on the Mississippi river, and to prevent destructive floods. Amendments consist of only two unimportant verbal changes.
