Ex-Postmaster General Creswell. DeForrest Henry Pew, Oil Man. DeForrest Henry Pew, one of the most ninent residents of Washington, Pa., an Superintendent of the Southwest Pennsylvania pipe lines in the Washington field died suddenly of pneumonia Tuesday. Mr Pew had been ill only two days and his Pew had been ill only two days and his condition was not considered serious. The deceased was born in Commerce, Mich., in 1853, and had been engaged in the oil business since 1873, when he accepted the position of gauger for the Southwest in the Armstrong county field. From this position he rose rapidly to the office of Superintendent of the Washington field, where he has been located since the opening of the pool. He was a man of marked ability and had a wide acquaintance throughout every field in the East. He had many friends also in Pittsburg. A widow and two small children survive him.

John A. J. Creswell, ex-Postmaster General of the United States, died yesterday morning at Elkton, Md. He was born in Port Deposit, in the same State, in 1828. Twenty years after he graduated at Dickin-Twenty years after he graduated at Dickinson College, Pa. When the war broke out he was a member of the Legislature of his State, and afterward Assistant Adjutant General for Maryland. As an earnest friend of the Union he was next elected to Congress, and in 1885 to the United States Senate. He was delegate to various national and border State conventions. He was Postmaster General in President Grant's Cabinet until 1874.
