Four of the districts did not enter classes. These ere the Duquesne (Tenth ward), Colfax Fwenty-second ward), Monongahela Thirty-third ward), and Riverside (Thirty-third ward). urth ward).

The honors were taken again by Miss raham's Grant school. The highest per-ntage was made by a Grant pupil, Annie . Gill, whose average was 92. Homer W. volor, of the Grant, was second with 91. th Stanley McCasky, of the Moorhead olding the same position. Carrie Patter-m. of the Grant, made 90.2, and Bertie E. rehm, of the Grant, made 90. The Right of a Borough to Collect Vehicle License Is on Trial-The Measure Is Particularly Aimed at the Oil Men.

The question as to whether a borough can collect a vehicle tax from a non-resident will soon come before the courts for a decisive settlement. As the taxpayers of Coraopolis refused to allow the Council to borrow money the Committee on Ways and Means decided to lay a vehicle tax on professional teamsters reaching out far enough to catch any who hauled for others than themselves. The friends of the measure said it was for the purpose of making men who hauled for the oil men help keep the streets in order, it being asserted that the streets in order, it being asserted that they did more damage to the roads than all other haulers combined. Its opponents said the object was merely to ease the burden on heavy property holders. They charged that there should be no discrimination and that all who owned teams or rigs of any kind should be required to take out the license or else more. They arranged that if such restrictive noise were argued that if such restrictive policy were to be persisted in Council would act wisely to buy posts and boards and fence in the town. Some of the teamsters kicked and

town. Some of the teamsters kicked and carried the matter into court after a Justice of the Pence had decided against them, but Judge Slagel decided that the ordinance was dust-proof.

John Trunick, however, a Moon township farmer, wasn't satisfied and got Attorncy Osborne to take the case into court. Some people said that Trunick was charged with the license because he hauled milk into the borough to sell, but it seems he did some hauling for the oil men, but denies that he is a professionul teamster.

OFFICIAL-GLENFIELD. ORDINANCE NO. 24—AN ORDINANCE right to recet telegraph poles.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Borough of Gienfield, Pa., in Council assembled, and it is bereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same. bereby ordalized and enacted by authority of the same.

Section lat.—That the privilege be and is hereby granted the "Philadelphia Company" to erect telegraph poles on the streets of the Borough of Gienfield as may be necessary to conduct a telegraph wire through the Borough of Gienfield.

Section 2d—That in the constructing of said telegraph line the said company shall not in any manner interfere with existing lines of telegraph.

Section 3d—That all poles piaced within the borough limits shall be straight and of a uniform height and high enough to not interfere with the free and uninterrupted ousiness on the streets, and to be placed where the Street Committee of the Borough Council may direct.

Section 4th—That the Borough Council authorities shall have the privilege if desired to use said poles for the purpose of placing lampa and lights thereon, and for the free use of transmitting measures through and over said wires and the company's telephones.
