My rope was used to hang the eleven men at Fort Madison, and God only knows how many others that have never been accounted for. When there I became well acquainted with Brigham Young. He was a wiry, devilish kind of a fellow, and at that time had 20 wives as dirty and despisable as he was. One time I saw Young and his 20 wives go in bathing with a lot of others in the Miss ssinni river. Nineteen of the women had bables with them, and while they were in the water the childless woman took care of the kids. They were very scant bathing costumes and seemed to have no idea whatever of modesty.

The Mormons were hated by all the other people in the neighborhood, and no wonder, because they did nothing but steal.
