"SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.] PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 4 .- Among the most important of the opinions delivered by the Supreme Court to-day was one by Chief Justice Faxson regarding the incumbency of the present Superintendent of Public Instruction, D. J. Waller, in which the judgment of the lower court is reversed and Mr. Waller is allowed to hold the office for the unexpired term of E. E. Higbee. This was n writ of quo warranto issued at the request of the Attorney General directed to D. J. Waller, requiring him to show by what authority he claims to exercise the duties of

Commonwealth. On the 14th of February, 1890, Governor Beaver appointed and commissioned D. J. Waller, Jr., Superintendent of Public In-

Superintendent of Public Instruction of the

Waller, Jr., Superintendent of Public Instruction, vice E. E. Higbee, deceased. In pursuance of this appointment Waller duly qualified entered upon the performance of the duties of the office, and has continued therein until this time. The Senate was not in session at the time of this appointment. The next session of the Senate began on the first Tuesday of January, 1891, and on the 6th of the same month Beaver, being still Governor, nominated Waller to the Senate for condirmation to the office for the term of four vears to date from the first day of March, 1896, and on the 20th day of the same month (January) the Senate confirmed such nomination and appointment.

Governor Reaver went out of office January friends.

The next session of the Senate began on the first Tuesday of January, 1891, and on the 6th of the same mouth Beaver, being still Governor, nominated Waller to the Senate for confirmation to the office for the term of four years to date from the first day of March, 1896, and on the 20th day of the same month (January) the Senate confirmed such nomination and appointment.

Governor Beaver went out of office January 20, 1891, and Robert E. Pattison was on the same day duly inaugurated Governor. No commission was issued to Waller by Governor Puttison. On the contrary, he appointment was rejected by the Senate May 25, 1891. On the day after the Senate May 25, 1891. On the day after the Senate adjourned the Governor appointed and commissioned Snyder to the office for the full term of four years, notwithstanding his rejection by the Senate.

The Court says, There are three things

The Court says: There are three things about which there is no dispute, viz.: There was a vacancy: the vacancy was filled by appointment by the Governor, and the Governor's appointee was appointed by the Senate. How long is the respondent entitled to hold the office under his appointment and confirmation by the Senate? Governor Beaver exercised his power, he filled the vacancy occasioned by the death of Higbee. His appointment appoint by the Senate, the respondent is in office by virtue of an appointment properly made under the Constitution and laws of the State. The confirmation of the respondent by the Senate necessarily extends his original appointment for the balance of the unexpired term.


