

TAYLOR IS ON TRIAL

A Delicate Point of Law to Be Decided in the Bowman Case.

STORY OF THE DUQUESNE MURDER

The trial of James N. Taylor, charged with the killing of H. W. Bowmanmaster at Duquesne, on the night of December 3, 1919, was commenced in Criminal Court yesterday before Judge Porter.
