## BATTLE LINES DRAWN.

Local Union 230, of the Brotherhood of Carpenters, Suspended.

NOW A FIGHT FOR SUPREMACY.

Many Brotherhood Men Will Join the Amalgamated Carpenters.

SOME GENERAL INDUSTRIAL NOTES

Local union 230, of the Brotherhood of Carpenters, has been suspended from the national body. This was not a surprise to those who were familiar with the strife which has existed between the local and the national body. It started before the strike of last May and had grown in bitterness right along until last Friday night, when the local was suspended.

This action was kept from the public until vesterday, when E. A. Holmes, who has been the ringleader of the Brotherhood's opposition, informed a DISPATCH reporter of it. Mr. Holmes said:

"You know how the trouble started. Last winter when the vote was taken to decide whether we would strike, the ballot was decidedly against striking.

Cansod by Last Summer's Strike. "The District Council gobbled the reports, however, and declared the strike. This action was opposed by many members of the Brotherhood. I was especially opposed to is and begun a fight against this illegal procedure. I was tried just after the conclusion of the strike and acquitted. General Secretary P. J. McGuire had me tried again for naving given an interview to The Dis-parch on July 15, 1891. I was again sequitted. McGuire took an appeal from this decision to the General Executive Board. That body ordered 230 to try me again, but it refused and the mat-ter has been hanging fire ever since.

Recently I was elected to represent 230 in the District Council. I had twice filled his position before, and had always a good following. As soon as the 'gang' found I was elected, they wrote to McGuire advising the suspension of 230, which he promptly did. They have already organized a new union out of the few members in 230, who were not against the Brotherhood. The conservative and free thinking element though were excluded.

Carpenters Descri the Brotherhood, feThe outcome of the suspension will be that nearly all of the members of 230 and 600 or 700 other members of the Brotherhnod will leave it. They will either join the Amalgamated Association of Carpenters or go it alone free from all unions. The thing most probable is that we will join the Amalgamated. We do not want any strikes,

and think that by square dealing with the builders we will be treated fairly. "Another reason why the Brotherhood wanted to get rid of us was so they could order another strike next May. Its unions are already taking votes on the question, and every possible means is being used by them to get the other trades to join them. There are not more than 600 or 700 carpenters in the city who will join in a strike.

The Master House Painters and Decorators' Association of Pennsylvania convened at Harrisburg to-day, and will remain in session two days. A hundred delegates are present, among them President Titus Berpresent, among them President Titus Berger, W. L. Antrim, George Butler, M. D. Cohen, Charles McCarty, William Pegley, Joseph B. Scattergood, G. A. Sexaner, J. O. Shepherd, Andrew Shorigi, Pittsburg; J. L. Boardman, Allegheny. Governor Patterson welcomed the delegates in an address on the value of organization. The reports read were encouraging, Secretary and Treasurer John Sturgen. Jr., reporting the receipts during the year at \$324 06; expenditures, \$257 84; balance, \$64 22.
