#### But Plenty of Tondies Are Left.

The upper and middle classes seem to be touched by the incidents of the Duke of Clarence's death. Thousands clad in mourning have flocked to Marlborough House to record their names, and throughout the capital well-dressed folk generally are don-ning some badge of grief. The Gezette tonight directs that all persons wear mourning until February 28, while detailed orders are riven to the court and to the army.

The alarm of society people over the pros-pect of social reunions being under a taboo greater part of the coming season, will relieved by the announcement that the agnizing the necessities of society, will hold the usual May drawing rooms and levees. The Prince of Wales and family will not appear in public for a year to come. The Princess of Wales after funeral is going to some secluded spot in the south of Europe with her daughter. Both are in delicate health, and their condition is now the source of increased anx-iety to the family. The death of the Duke of Clarence has recalled the fact that he was born prematurely, and that he always lacked the robustness of Prince George.

The Wales Family in Bad Health.

The Princess of Wales has not yet recovered from her grief and prostration. The latest annound ent from Sandringham to night is that Dr. Laking is detained, watching the Princess of Wales and Princess May, fearing that influenza may attack them. Prince George, who is still weak from his attack of typhoid fever, is also the cause of anxiety. The doctors have advised Wales as soon as possible to remove his family from the scene of afflic

Princess May's future is undoubtedly the precedent for her marriage to Prince George, the incident is recalled of the leath of the Czarewitch in 1865, after his betrothal to Princess Dagmar, now the wife of his brother, the present Czar.

So profound and universal is the symver her less, that it would be no surprise if Parliament accorded her some pro-vision as a "maiden widow." If the report be true that Prince George is attached to a daughter of Prince Christian, his known strong will makes the project of an alliance with Princess May improbable.

#### Prince George Is the Favorite.

the family circle Prince George has long been recognized as the superior of his brother in intellect, force of character and open geniality of disposition. From od he has always held his own against his brother's pretensions as the elder. It is on record how, quarrelling as boys over the possession of a goat chaise, George promptly hit his brother in the eve and then seized and kept the chaise by his superior strength. Their minimal affection was undoubtedly great, but Albert Victor was the weaker vessel. The concurrent opinion of those around the throne points to the future poplarity of Prince George if he lives to become King.

The Queen has not yet decided on the date of the funeral, but it will probably be Thursday next, Cabinet co Thursday next.
